Strong community turnout for Guyra grill session

Residents turned out in strong numbers for the recent Guyra Community Grill Session, taking the opportunity to speak directly with elected representatives and senior Armidale Regional Council staff about issues affecting the local community.

Councillor Eli Imad thanked those who attended, saying the forum highlighted the importance of community engagement in shaping local decision-making.

“The strong turnout demonstrated how much people care about the future of Guyra and the issues facing our community,” Cr Imad said.

The forum formed part of Cr Imad’s election commitment to improve communication and engagement between Council and residents, providing a platform for community members to raise concerns, ask questions and share ideas.

Mayor Sam Coupland and Councillor Susan McMichael attended the session, along with several senior council staff members, including Chief Officer Planning and Activation Daniel Boyce, Chief Officer Assets and Services Darren Schaefer, Chief Officer Corporate and Community Aimee Hutton, Manager Water and Wastewater Mark

Byrne, and Manager Transport Meroch Suesser-Shaker.

A range of topics were discussed during the meeting, with residents seeking information on local infrastructure, services and future planning for the Guyra area.

While the session was largely constructive, proceedings were at times disrupted by repeated interruptions from one attendee. Cr Imad said it was disappointing

that the behaviour detracted from what was otherwise a positive and productive community discussion.

“The overwhelming majority of those present attended in good faith and engaged respectfully with councillors and council staff,” he said.

Despite the interruptions, organisers considered the forum a success, with many residents taking advantage of the opportunity

to engage directly with Council representatives.

Cr Imad said he remains committed to holding future community forums and ensuring residents continue to have opportunities to discuss local issues and provide feedback directly to Council. He advised that to help maintain a respectful and orderly environment, security personnel will be present at future community forums.

Guyra man among six charged during domestic violence operation

A 54-year-old Guyra man is among six people charged following a three-day police operation targeting domestic and family violence offenders across the New England region.

Operation Shield was conducted by police from the Western Region between 16th and 18th June, focusing on the apprehension of wanted domestic violence offenders and proactive enforcement activities.

The operation involved officers from the Western Region Operations Support Group, Region Enforcement Squad, Domestic Violence High Risk Offender Team and New England Police District.

Across the operation, six people were charged with a combined 14 alleged offences. Police also seized two firearms, conducted eight drug seizures, six Firearm Prohibition Order searches and executed one search warrant.

In Guyra, police executed a

search warrant and digital evidence access order at a residence about 10am on 16th June.

A 54-year-old man was arrested after officers allegedly located prohibited drugs, firearms and cash during a search of the property.

Police will allege they seized 11.8 grams of methylamphetamine, 0.5 grams of heroin, 24.4 grams of cannabis leaf, 1.4 grams of cannabis seed, two compact folding pistols and an amount of cash.

The man was taken to Armidale Police Station and charged with nine offences, including four counts of possessing a prohibited drug, two counts of supplying a prohibited drug, two counts of possessing an unauthorised pistol and one count of recklessly dealing with the proceeds of crime.

He was initially refused bail before being granted conditional bail and appeared before Armidale Local Court on 22nd June.

In a separate incident, a 21-year-old Armidale man was charged with allegedly contravening a domestic violence-related apprehended violence order following a Firearm Prohibition Order search.

Another Armidale man, aged 37, was issued with a court attendance notice after police allegedly located cannabis while serving him with a Firearm Prohibition Order and Weapon Prohibition Order.

Police said the operation formed part of ongoing efforts to target domestic and family violence offenders and reduce related crime across the region.

Investigations continue and similar operations are expected to be conducted in the future.

Police remind anyone experiencing domestic or family violence that support is available through 1800RESPECT on 1800 737 732. In an emergency, call Triple Zero (000).

Sheep and lamb drive to support rescue helicopter service

Local livestock producers are being encouraged to support the annual Sheep and Lamb Drive for the Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service, which will be held next Tuesday, June 30th.

The drive is in support of the Guyra team in the annual Ride for the Chopper, which is one of the major fundraising events for the service in the New England region.

This year, the riders will tackle the journey from the out-back town of Lightning Ridge to Tamworth, covering hundreds of kilometres in support of the lifesaving service. All proceeds go directly towards keeping the vital emergency service operating across regional New South Wales.

The Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service provides a 24-hour, seven-day-a-week critical care and rescue service, ensuring patients can access urgent medical assistance when they need it



most. Importantly, the service remains free for those who rely on it, thanks to the generosity of communities and fundraising efforts such as the Sheep and Lamb Drive.

Organisers are calling on producers to donate sheep or lambs

to help raise funds for the helicopter service and support its ongoing operations.

Coalition Pledges support for Feral Pig Funding and Return of Seniors Travel Card

Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan has welcomed two major commitments announced by the NSW Coalition, including a \$300 million biosecurity program targeting feral animals and the reinstatement of the Regional Seniors Travel Card if elected in 2027.

The proposed biosecurity package would fund the coordination and management of invasive species across NSW, with a particular focus on feral pigs, which continue to cause significant damage to agricultural land and native ecosystems.

Mr Moylan said feral pigs remain a major concern for farmers across the Northern Tablelands.

“Feral pigs have a major impact on the farming sector, eating newborn lambs, damaging water sources, fences and pasture, and raiding agricultural crops,” he

said.

The Coalition’s proposed program includes increased funding for pest control measures, five-year funding arrangements, expanded aerial shooting programs, improved trapping technology, thermal imaging and drone surveillance, exclusion fencing, and the trial of a targeted feral pig bounty scheme.

The package would also establish regional rapid response teams and introduce stronger requirements for public land managers to control pest animal populations.

NSW Opposition Leader Kellie Sloane said stronger biosecurity measures were needed to protect the state’s agricultural industries.

“Without urgent action on biosecurity, our agricultural industries are at serious risk,” she said.

In a separate announcement,



Mr Moylan said a Coalition government would restore the Regional Seniors Travel Card, which was discontinued by the Minns Government in 2023.

The card would provide eligible regional seniors with \$250 annually to help cover the cost of fuel,

taxis and pre-booked train or coach travel.

Mr Moylan said the program had been widely used throughout the Northern Tablelands before it was discontinued.

“From 2020 until the program ended, more than 54,000 seniors across the Northern Tablelands used the card, receiving more than \$7.3 million in assistance,” he said.

He said seniors in regional areas often faced greater transport challenges due to distance and limited public transport options.

NSW Nationals Leader Gurmeh Singh said the card would help regional seniors access essential services and maintain social connections.

The commitments form part of the NSW Coalition’s policy platform ahead of the 2027 state election.

Man charged over alleged stabbing in Guyra

A 27-year-old man has been arrested over an alleged stabbing in Guyra on the weekend.

Officers attached to New England Police District were called to a home on Sole Street, Guyra, about 1.45pm on Sunday 21st June, with reports of a stabbing.

Police were told a 27-year-old man allegedly stabbed a man in his 30s in the back during an argument at the home, before leaving the scene. A woman and a child were also in the home at the time of the alleged incident. No further injuries were reported.

The man was taken to Armidale Hospital where he was treated for a laceration to his back; he was later released.

Following inquiries, about 4.45pm on Monday June 22nd, police attended a unit on Canambe Street, Armidale, where they found a 27-year-old

man allegedly fleeing the home and making attempts to jump over the fence.

Officers arrested the man – who was allegedly in possession of a hunting knife at the time – despite his alleged attempts to resist arrest. Several officers suffered minor lacerations during the arrest.

The 27-year-old man was taken to Armidale Police Station where he was charged with, wound person with intent to cause grievous bodily harm, hinder or resist police officer in the execution of duty, assault police officer in execution of duty without actual bodily harm, carry cutting weapon upon apprehension.

New England Police formally refused the suspect bail and he was scheduled to appear before Bail Division Court 5 on Tuesday 23rd June.

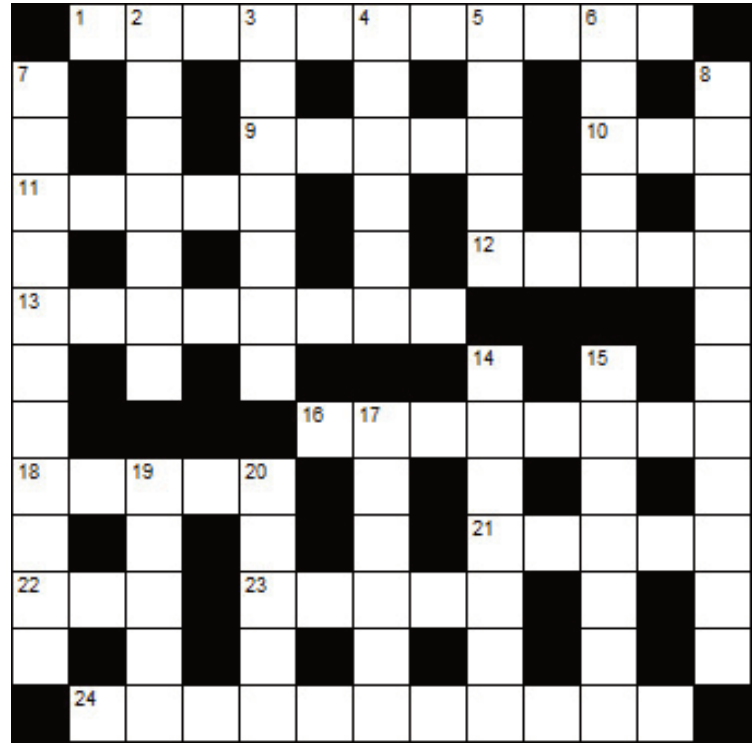

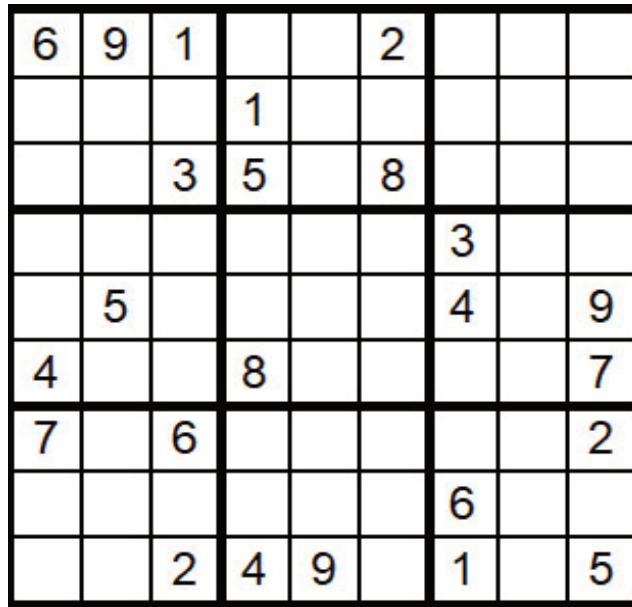

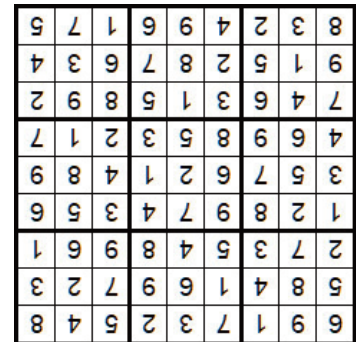

Winter Work Pays Off in the garden

Winter in Guyra is not for the faint-hearted gardener. With regular frosts, sub-zero mornings and the occasional snowfall, many plants take a well-earned rest during June, July and August.

A dryer than usual start to the year meant that many gardens had already seen struggling before winter set in. Recent rain and milder temperatures have been a relief for gardeners, and now is a good time to take stock of what is happening. While growth slows above ground, winter can also be one of the most productive seasons for gardeners willing to brave the cold.

The biggest challenge at Guyra's elevation is frost. Tender vegetables have long since succumbed to the cold and but there are many that thrive in cooler conditions. If you planted winter vegetables in autumn, (think hardy brassi-



cas, frost tolerant root vegetables and leafy greens), they will have benefitted from the recent rain and may even be ready to harvest.

Fruit trees are dormant, making winter the perfect time for planting and pruning. Guyra's climate is particularly suited to apples, pears, cherries and plums, all of which require significant winter chilling to produce quality fruit. Bare-root trees are now arriving in nurseries and generally establish well when planted during the colder months.

The garden may look bare, but soil improvement carried out now pays dividends later. Adding compost, aged manure and mulch

helps protect soil from temperature extremes while encouraging earthworm activity whenever conditions warm. A thick layer of mulch also helps reduce winter weed growth and protects plant roots from repeated freeze-thaw cycles.

Flower lovers should not overlook winter either. Daffodils, jonquils and tulips planted earlier in autumn are quietly developing beneath the soil and will provide welcome colour when spring arrives. Camellias and hellebores (Winter Rose) also shine through the colder months, providing bright blooms when little else is flowering. You can also plant pansies, violas, polyanthus, and snapdragons for some mid-winter colour.

Winter is also an excellent time to assess the garden's structure. Without summer foliage, it is easier to identify overcrowded trees, damaged branches and areas that may benefit from additional shelter belts or windbreak plantings.

Perhaps the most important lesson for Guyra gardeners is patience. Our growing season is shorter than many parts of Australia, but a little work during winter sets the foundation for a productive and colourful spring.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb

June 16th - Yarding of 2052 comprising 1150 crossbred lambs, 180 store lambs and 722 sheep.

Sales are being held fortnightly. Next sale is Tuesday June 30th.

Armidale Cattle Sale

June 18th - 735 cattle were scanned in Armidale. A slight increase to a fortnight ago. It was a mixed quality yarding of predominately yearling and weaner cattle. All major buyers were active in a mostly dearer market. Young cattle to the trade ranged

from 498c to 536c/kg. Yearling steers and heifers to feed were considerably dearer. The steers ranged from 536c to 592c/kg while the heifers made between 400c and 539c/kg. Light steers to the restocker made to 670c to average 604c/kg while the heifers ranged from 400c to 548c/kg. Prime grown cattle to the processor ranged from 440c to 544c/kg. Cows were 5 to 8c dearer. 2 and 3 score cows to the processor made from 330c to 372c/kg. Prime heavy weight cows made from 375c to 393c/kg and the best bulls got to 394c/kg.

Weekly Wool Market

June 19th - The market recorded another overall gain this week led by the strength of the Crossbred and Carding sectors. Just over 21,000 bales were offered nationally with the Western region not in operation. In the Northern region the indicator gained 10 cents on Tuesday and lost 1 cent on Wednesday. Individual micron indicators varied from plus 35 cents to minus 25 cents with downward movements restricted to the 17.5 and 18 micron indicators. When looked at in US dollars the market managed to regain almost all

of the 22 cents that it lost last week. 20,393 bales were sold with a passed in rate of 4%. Major buyers included Techwool, Sequoia and PJ Morris. Next week is the final sale of the 2025/26 season. As it stands the market is at its highest level for the season and its highest level since March 2019. Only 11 selling weeks registered a negative result this season in the Northern region with 32 weeks on the positive side of the ledger. The new seasons selling programme will run for four weeks before pausing for a three week recess.
