# New CEO appointed to lead Council

Mr Peter Dennis has been appointed to the position of Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Armidale Regional Council. He replaces Interim General Manager Glenn Wilcox who resigned in early October citing 'personal reasons'.

A recruitment process for the appointment of a new CEO began in October with 24 high quality applications received. Seven candidates were subsequently interviewed by a panel that included Administrator Dr Ian Tiley, Deputy Vice Chancellor of the University of New England Sue Thomas, former Mayor of Guyra and Deputy Chair of the Local Representation Advisory Committee Hans Hietbrink, Glenn Inglis former member of the Independent Local Government Review Panel and recently elected Councillor of Tamworth Regional Council and recruitment consultant Stephen Blackadder.

Mr Dennis recently concluded his four year contract with SE-QWater in Queensland as Chief Executive Officer.

"The Panel was very impressed with Peter, his obvious skills and experience but in particular his desire to work with the new Council and to be part of the regional community," said Dr Tiley.

# New mobile phone towers coming our way

MOBILE phone reception blackspots in the Guyra area will soon be further reduced with the announcement of State government funding to construct new phone towers at Baldersleigh, Aberfoyle and Wongwibinda.

Improvements in network coverage will be delivered through the State Government's investment of \$15 million into the round 2 of the Federal Mobile Blackspot Program.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that this is a great example of State and Federal Governments and the private sector working together to improve access to the network for country people and maximise the number of towers that could be built.

"These towers will greatly enhance safety and the ability for people in our region to go about their daily lives and business activities," Mr Marshall said.

"This program will make a tangible improvement to people's lives in our region and I want to see even more benefit in the future." Mr Marshall said the combined Commonwealth and NSW Government investment was the greatest increase in mobile network coverage to metropolitan, regional and remote communities delivered by a single public funding program in the history of Australian mobile communications.



# **Dedication of memorial seat**

A large number of golfers and local residents gathered at the golf course on Saturday November 26, to dedicate a memorial seat and play an unusual tournament to celebrate the contribution and dedication of life member Bruce Thomson.

Bruce, who recently passed away, was both a highly regarded citizen and club member. He was a Sydney boy who was first attracted to Guyra by a local girl Noeline Starr, whom he married in 1961.

Although Bruce worked for the agricultural company Grazcos, the family was based in Sydney until Bruce and several partners launched the first electronic livestock weighing company in the world. The company, known as Ruddweigh, was based in Guyra and the concept expanded rapidly becoming probably the second largest private employer in town apart from the abattoir.

During his spare time Bruce took up golf which he enjoyed im-

mensely. He was extremely generous to the struggling club, with broken machinery being repaired by Ruddweigh free of charge.

In 1994 Bruce and a group of senior players formed the Guyra Veteran Golfers, of which Bruce was the Secretary/Treasurer for 17 years and the driving force in its expansion, organizing tournaments and working bees. He also obtained government grants which resulted in the golf cart sheds and the course toilets.

Bruce was involved with the amalgamation of the Golf and Bowling Clubs and initiated the rejuvenation of Saturday golf with the 'Mollie Sole' competition, benefitting the whole community. His contribution was recognized by all members with life membership several years ago.

A dream of Bruce's was fulfilled with the golf event being a two person ambrose over 10 holes, all 3 par holes. The winner was Joyce Betts and Jenny Rogers.





Level 4: For children who can swim 25metres or more and wants to improve on their strokes in Freestyle, Backstroke, and Breaststroke and want to learn Butterfly




# Large fields at annual Bowls Carnival
