The issue of forced council mergers has not been laid to rest by the recent State Government announcements.

The community has every right to be outraged by the manner in which this merger was determined, announced and undertaken. It was underhand from a government that said "there would be no forced amalgamation" and all the palaver beforehand with the community was a waste of time as it appears the decision to merge was made well in advance.

There was no real case made by the Government as to why these mergers would be beneficial to the residents of the various council areas. If it is all right now to back down on the many mergers around the state, then the case for these mergers must have been pretty thin in the first place. To really rub salt into the wound, if there was a court case pending then the Government backed down on that merger as well.

Last week following the merger wind back announcements, I wrote to the NSW Nationals State Leader and Deputy Premier John Barilaro and amongst other comments advised "the way forward for this is to unwind the Guyra/Armidale merger, accept the pain that this will create for unnamed persons and start to regain trust of the Nationals in our community ...". To date I have only received a holding reply.

Adam Marshall, our supportive local member was advised, and has informed me that he is bound by cabinet solidarity not to discuss the decision process. So what went on in cabinet?

So I call upon residents of Guyra to support this Sunday's march through the streets of Guyra, to give a strong message of support to the other councils involved that we will not roll over and have our independence taken from us without a fight. Unfortunately I will be in Port Macquarie that day welcoming a Rotary team of Germans from the Rhine Ruhr district. As I have been organising this cultural and vocational exchange for the past 12 months I must be there to greet them.

With support for our community comes responsibility of the residents. We need younger, concerned, energetic residents to stand as councillors to ensure that Guyra has a fair say in the running of the Armidale Regional Council should we remain "merged". Don't keep blaming "them", it is up to us and you. The torch of concern and leadership needs to be grasped by Guyra's residents. Are you up to it? If not, don't whinge about what is going on in Armidale as you would have lost that right by not being involved.

No matter what happens, Guyra will continue to be a strong, energetic, and growing community but it will need your vocal and meaningful support in the Regional Council. Go to their meetings, be a burr in the saddle and don't ever let up.

Guyra ANTY group is outraged to witness our right to a democratic future ripped from our grasp - to be left as bystanders seeing those with the means, financially fit, and prepared to mount a legal challenge "off the hook". It is extraordinary to reward those undertaking legal action and ignore those who are not.

It seriously pains us to witness the democratic will of the people so clearly demonstrated being so clearly and equally ignored. It is more important now than ever to assert our democratic right at the ballot box with a good field to choose from.

Amalgamation here to stay

The New South Wales Government confirmed last week that Armidale Regional Council will remain in its merged form.

Premier Gladys Berejiklian, Deputy Premier John Barilaro and Minister for Local Government Gabrielle Upton announced that all 2016 merged councils across NSW will remain in place.

Council Administrator Dr Ian Tiley said that this announcement puts to rest any uncertainty about the future of Armidale Regional Council. It is here to stay.

"We continue to focus our efforts in making Armidale Regional Council a strong, high performing council for the community," he said. "We will continue to work hard to deliver better services for our citizens."

"Since Armidale Regional Council was proclaimed last May, we have been striving to give residents and ratepayers a better deal. Every decision Council has made is guided by one principle - doing what's right for residents and ratepayers. By working smarter, we're finding more money that can be put into frontline services and better infrastructure."

"While there may be mixed feelings about this decision in our region, it is undeniable that residents and ratepayers would have been worse off if the merger was undone," said Dr Tiley. "The cost of 'unscrambling the eggs' would have been detrimental to Council administration and services, businesses and therefore to the whole community."

Some of the benefits to this region since the amalgamation have come about thanks to the NSW Government's Stronger Communities Fund. \$10 million has been invested in infrastructure projects and community projects in the Armidale Regional Council local government area as a result of the funding which was a one-off allocation to merged councils.

According to Dr Tiley, the residents of Armidale Regional Council can rest assured that when the reins are handed over to the new councillors in a few months, the community will be in a better place.

"Council elections are less than seven months away. Until then, we will keep working hard for the community and ensuring we have a Council that's in excellent shape," said Dr Tiley. "The September elections will then restore local decision-making to our region."

ANTY remains strong and vows to fight on

Disappointment, resentment, dismay, despondency, anger, deflation, depression, hopelessness and bitterness.

These were just some of the emotions that were expressed at a gathering of residents organised last week by the Guyra Amalgamation No Thank You (ANTY).

Speakers identified the anomaly of Councils in the city, those with pending court action and those without, creating three different classes of local government ratepayers in NSW.

Over eighty people present agreed by a show of hands to continue their public protest and to stand strong for democracy. They are urging the town to rally on Sunday February 26th at midday demanding their democratic rights.

Attendees at the meeting heard that although mergers are claimed to be successful, of those councils merged in 2001 and 2004 37% had negative growth, 73% FAILED in the "fit for the future" assessment process. 27% passed "fit for the future" and of those 77% applied for rate increases above the rate pegging (the average being a 30% increase)

That is neither a recommendation in favour of mergers, nor does it support claims made for the success of merged councils. "Our Armidale Regional Council financial advisor's statement for the Council Meeting Agenda document December 7th, 2016 suggests a double digit rate rise is needed in the Armidale Regional Council now," ANTY spokeperson Beth White said. "This is only restricted by the 4 year rate freeze due to the merger."

"The petition is still relevant - find it and sign It!"

"Amalgamations will not fix the deep seated problems of local government that stem from failure of federal government to honour commitment to a percentage of funding, cost shifting between levels of government and practices of the state leaving councils vulnerable to \$1billion in real terms."

"Urgently write to political representatives of all persuasions to express the concern for maintenance of democratic process and above all else our identity," she said. "The petition is still relevant - find it and sign It!"

Join the rally this Sunday February 26th commencing at 12 noon. The rallying point will be next to St Vincent de Paul in Bradley St (opposite P.O. and Council chambers). It will then proceed along the footpath to the NAB carpark and up to the Big Lamb on the highway. Vehicular traffic will continue along and cross the line coming back on the highway to the site.

The colour theme is Orange imagination is the only limitation. Wear orange shirts, hats, balloons, streamers, decorations and bring along your banners, posters and signs.

Mrs White said there is also an urgency for ratepayers to respond to the Draft Strategic Plan that was drawn from the response of just 2% of the population. She said that comment on the draft fees and charges that fails to recognise relevant fees for Guyra ratepayers, is also worthy of an urgent response.

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale Weekly Market Report

There was a yarding of 6800 sheep and lambs at Guyra on February 15th. Lamb numbers were down 600 on the previous week with 3950 yarded. There was an increase in sheep numbers up 1100 from the previous week with 2850 yarded.

Young lambs made up the bulk of the offering with a good selection of trade and heavy weights. There was a good representation of store lambs, both crossbred and young Merinos. All buyers from last week were operating with demand high across all classes.

Market trends were generally dearer. Crossbred young lambs to restockers sold on a firm to slightly dearer market trend. Trade weight young lambs experienced significant price improvements with limited supplies available in the North this week. Heavy and extra heavy weight young lambs averaged \$2 to \$6 a head dearer.

There were some sales in the lower end of the weight range showing a greater improvement with the involvement of domestic trade buyers. Heavy and extra heavy weight old lambs also sold to a dearer trend. There was a good supply of well finished medium and heavy weight sheep penned. Demand was also strong with market trends firm to dearer.

Young lambs sold to a top of \$181, Lambs to \$208, Hoggetts to \$115, Ewes to \$120, Wethers to \$136 and Rams to \$92.

Why the crate recycling system?

Why does Council use a crate system for the recycling collection service and not a mechanized system such as the wheelie bin that is used by many other Councils?

Council has deliberately used the crate system up to now as it achieves a very low contamination rate which we know from industry statistics can not be matched by the mechanised wheelie bin system. We consistently achieve less than 3% contamination with the crate system which is one of the lowest, if not the lowest across the state.

In other Council areas, the wheelie bin system is known to routinely have contamination rates over 10% and up to 30% in problem areas. The advantage of the crate system is that the collection operator is able to see the contents of the crates before loading and can easily and efficiently reject contaminated recyclables.

Comments can be left at http://yoursay. armidale.nsw.gov.au or written submissions can be emailed to The size of the crates does not limit the amount of recyclables that can be disposed of as residents can put out as many crates as they need at no extra cost for collection.

Council operates a two component recycling collection service. One crate should be sorted to contain clean paper and cardboard and another to contain cans, glass and plastic bottles and other items and other recyclable containers all rinsed and with lids removed. Additional crates have to be provided by residents as required.

History of Library Services

Guyra Library started in 1947 and as a small girl I remember the first librarian, Mrs Rixon, very well. She boarded with my grandmother and I remember her as a very stern and serious lady, the same as my grandmother.

I first started borrowing from the library when we moved to town when I was nine years old. When borrowing from the library you could only whisper - no noise allowed. Originally Guyra had 9000 books, one of the biggest libraries around. It was housed in what is now the RSL Building. The second librarian was Mr V Prescott.

In 1957 the Library moved across the road to a building purchased by Guyra Shire Council. The then Shire President Leslie Thomas Starr, school headmaster Jack Whiteford and Shire Clerk John Richardson were the instigators. Mr Starr died suddenly while in office and the building was named after him in appreciation for all his tireless work and effort.

Miss Joy Varley (now Finlayson) was

the librarian at the time of the move. With the assistance of Miss Marie Heagney it was a mammoth task to move to the new building. Around this time outlying library services were started and small schools received a box of books monthly. Mrs Madge Sole remembers receiving them at Lilygrove school.

The next librarian was Julie Sole (Vallis) and she was followed by Sheila Fullerton and Bronwen Clark. Bronwen remained at the library for 28 years. There have been several assistant librarians over time including Yvonne Penn, Cath Lockyer and Clare Swinton.

Aimee Hutton took over from Bronwen and is on maternity leave, however she did much of the work to have today's celebration. Wendy Warner is the relieving librarian.

On November 2nd, 2011 the present library was opened and this year we mark 70 years of library service to the town.
