No-one knows LOCAL like we do



The Orange by-election experience set the theme and encouraged the group of protesters who gathered in Guyra on Sunday. Decked out in all shades of orange, the group of about 200 included our very youngest citizens through representation across the age spectrum, to our very own centenarian.

The protest was organised by the Guyra Amalgamation No Thank You (ANTY) group who have stepped up their campaign to have the amalgamation of Guyra Shire and Armidale Dumaresq councils overturned.

Expressive banners shouted against forced amalgamation, demanded democratic rights at grass

root level and highlighted betrayal, loss of council, of voice, and of identity.

ANTY Spokesperson Beth White said that there was a feeling that complacency in State Parliament is working against local democratic rights.

"The Armidale Regional Council Draft Community Strategic Plan sees strength in unity," she said. "However, the pursuit of oneness defies the strengths of the diversity in the region, particularly the towns, villages and the rural sector. It results in loss of rural votes and reduced rural representation."

It was made clear that the next state election will be in the last week of March 2019.

"A number of political careers have been tossed by support of council mergers, but equally some parties hold strong against amalgamations and see merit in demergers like those rolling out in Queensland," Beth said. "There is wisdom in evaluating those options to register your views at the ballot box."

Meantime ANTY are urging residents to continue to support the petition campaign to ensure the matter is debated in parliament not just signed off as policy and by the stroke of a pen.

The petition has been boosted by signatures gathered at the show and

those recently sent from Gundagai.

"Ratepayers are urged to watch the ARC website "Have your say" page or call at the Guyra Shire Office to collect copies of draft policy for scrutiny and comment," Beth said. "Comment on proposals/ plans and consider the effect that new charges, fees and policies will have on the community in which you live," she said. "With council elections set for September, our community will do well to look to encourage good candidates to stand for election to represent us."

"If you haven't signed the petition FIND it! SIGN it! and write to the politicians; all of them, to express your views."

In her address at the official opening of the Show, President Ellen Newberry said that the event had been indulged by some truly spectacular weather to showcase what a wonderful little town Guyra really is.

"Recently, I was reading through the Guyra Show Society's objectives - these were written over a hundred years ago and are still incredibly relevant today," Ellen said. "The Society aims to encourage the development of pastoral, agricultural, and horticultural pursuits by means of periodical exhibitions (namely the show), where examples of superior livestock, agricultural and horticultural products are awarded prizes."

"To this very day the society continues to achieve these aims - we've seen prize cattle, horses and poultry; an incredible display of wool in the pavilion and shearing in the woolshed; as well as fine art, crafts, cooking and horticultural products that showcase Guyra's agricultural excellence."

Rob Lenehan introduced Junior Showgirl entrants Briana Merritt and Taylah Martin.

Briana was announced as the winner and was sashed by life member and patron of the Show Society Frank Presnell.

Strong competition at Lamb Show

There was strong competition at the Guyra saleyards last Wednesday with producers vying for bragging rights as the winner of the champion lambs at the annual Show sale.

There was an increase of 2460 on the previous sale with a total of 6410 lambs on offer. Producers were invited to enter pens of 25 or more lambs to be in the running for prizes on offer from Landmark Guyra.

This year was the third year that the Lamb Show was sponsored by Landmark. Chris Sole from the Guyra Show Society was on hand to present the ribbons and prizes.

Judging took place prior to the sale, with the livestock buyers tasked with the job having a difficult decision.

Speaking on behalf of the judges Andrew Jackson said that the champion export pen shown by Stafford Youman were well presented and benefitted by being shorn.

"I know that producers are busy, but shearing really makes a difference when it comes to sale time," he said. "They were the stand out pen of the day."

The winning lambs sold for \$210, while the runners up from Westbrook Pastoral Co sold to \$185.

In the trade category Tim and Louise Moffatt took the honours with a pen described by the buyers as the 'freshest lambs on the hill'. They sold for \$175 with the runners up from Roslyn Partnership selling for \$160.

In the exotic breed category, the winning pen was exhibited by Shane Davidson and the runner up was Mulligan and Looker. They sold for \$182 and \$155 respectively.

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale Weekly Market Report

There was a yarding of 9650 sheep and lambs at the Guyra sale on February 22, up 2850 on the previous sale. On offer were 6410 lambs and 3240 sheep.

The annual lamb show and sale saw numbers increase and quality improve. There was an excellent penning of well finished heavy trade and export weight lambs, mostly 2nd cross. Restocker lambs were also well supplied. All the regular processors were in attendance along with strong restocker competition. Market trends varied with light and medium weight young lambs suitable to the restockers selling to a slightly dearer trend. The increased numbers in the trade weights impacted average prices in a market that saw the better quality lambs sell on a reasonably firm market trend. The secondary quality trade weights sold to a cheaper trend. Heavy and extra heavy weight lambs also saw the best remain firm with the increased numbers also having an impact on average prices. The sheep sale included some very good lines of well finished medium and heavy weight ewes and wethers. Market trends were dearer for all classes with some price improvement attributed to weight increases.

Council committed to a strong future

Armidale Regional Council is committed to a strong future and many good outcomes for the Guyra community.

Since the NSW Government created the merged Council in May 2016, Council has worked hard to engage with residents from across the new local government area (LGA).

"Genuine engagement is a high priority and will remain so," Council Administrator Dr Ian Tiley said. "We are working to establish a strong foundation for the new Council, consultation is integral to that process."

Strategies to provide community members with maximum opportunity to contribute to planning processes have included: listening tours, workshops, agency and other meetings, and 'pop-ups in Guyra main street, at the Guyra Lamb and Potato Festival, Guyra Sale Yards, and in Tingha, Ben Lomond, Wollomombi and Ebor.

A draft Community Strategic Plan was on six weeks public exhibition - during which time community members were encouraged to comment. Other planning processes are underway concurrently.

According to Dr Tiley, ensuring water security is fundamental to Guyra's future.

"A safe secure supply is a high priority," said Dr Tiley. "While Guyra has ample water most of the time, short intense dry spells coupled with high demand can see water levels in the dams drop rapidly."

Council is examining a range of strategies to ensure Guyra's water security including enlarging the town's existing dams, constructing a new dam or building a pipeline from Malpas Dam. A secure reliable water supply is also essential to support further growth of the town and local industries.

Several major Guyra-based projects are underway including the Kolora Aged Care Facility, the main street upgrade, soon to be approved and the replacement of Tenterden Bridge. There have also been several smaller community projects supported.

"As a result of the larger scale and capacity of the new council projects like Kolora have been brought forward," said Dr Tiley.

"A number of other projects like the main street upgrade are possible because of the NSW Government's Stronger Communities Fund and other State and Federal Government funding opportunities. \$10 million will be invested in infrastructure projects and community projects in the Armidale Regional Council local government area.

An Economic Development Strategy is currently underway for the new council.

"Planning for the future of the Guyra economy is a big component of the work going into the Armidale Region Economic Development Strategy," said Dr Tiley.

"Building on the success of the Costa Group's Tomato Farm, Council believes that Guyra has the potential to be the site for a range of glass house growers," Dr Tiley said. "Given its strong agricultural industry base and prospects for investment in 'smart agriculture', Guyra is well-positioned to be a hub of economic activity in the Armidale Region."

"If people in the Guyra region have issues or concerns relating to the Council I encourage them to meet with me," concluded Dr Tiley.

Council elections set for September

Following the amalgamation of Guyra Shire with Armidale Dumaresq in May 2016, the proclamation provided for the election of 11 councillors to the new Armidale Regional Council and for councillors to elect the Mayor, who will hold office for two years.

The new local government area is undivided and therefore has no wards. The first Armidale Regional Council elections will be held on September 9th this year.

The Electoral Commission NSW will conduct the election and the method of voting is proportional representation (similar to Senate voting) whereby a candidate gains a quota of the formal votes. A quota is the total number of formal votes divided by one more than the number of vacancies (12 plus one).

Administrator Dr Ian Tiley said that becoming a councillor is your opportunity to contribute to the new Armidale Regional Council community.

"It is in the community's best interest that the local government election, attracts a broad field of candidates reflecting the diversity of our community," he said.

"It is vital that the new council represents community interests and advocates for their aspirations and key priorities."

"I encourage potential candidates to make a well informed and considered decision about whether to stand for election as a councillor. Anyone is welcome to contact me to discuss the role of a councillor and attend any of the information sessions Council is holding about becoming a councillor," said Dr Tiley.

Prospective candidates and groups looking to contest the 2017 NSW Local Council Elections should familiarise themselves with the process for becoming a candidate at www.votenswinfo and follow the links to local government elections.

Ensuring Guyra's water security a top priority

HIGH level talks are underway to ensure Guyra has a water supply to secure the growing town's future and improve quality.

With more than 1,500 residents connected to the urban reticulated water supply network, the current system has little capacity for continued population growth or ability to cope during extended dry periods.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that water security and quality is a necessity for any community that hopes to grow and thrive.

"I have been approached by many locals wanting these issues resolved to provide certainty for the future and give the community more growth potential for business and industry," Mr Marshall said

"It's very tough to attract new residents to any community that has an unreliable water supply or has quality issues. Guyra has a lot to offer newcomers - but first, we need to ensure we have the capacity for the town to grow.

"I want this project to get started as quickly as possible and I think we may see a breakthrough

soon.

Options such as raising existing water supply dam walls or the construction of a new pipeline from the nearby Malpas Dam have long been raised as a possibility - however with cost estimates in the \$7-10 million range, council has historically lacked the funds for any progress.

Discussions are underway between Mr Marshall and Armidale Regional Council with Mr Marshall requesting council to prepare detailed plans on the options available so he can get started seeking support and funding from the state government.

"I'm looking forward to seeing the detailed plans so that I can go to work securing funding to get the project started and the water flowing for Guyra."

In addition to Guyra's residential population, water security is hugely important for industry. The local Tomato farm employs 500 people, and is dependent upon having a reliable source of potable water.

Mr Marshall says he's already exploring options for funding while council completes its plans.

Fees & charges under review

FEES and charges will change for residents of the former Guyra Shire and Armidale Dumaresq Councils that have continued to pay different rates since the merger.

Following a review of charges, Armidale Regional Council is expected to adopt a single-fee approach that will align costs for the merged councils

The revised fees and charges for the Planning and Environment Department are currently on public exhibition. The deadline for submissions has been extended until Wednesday 22 March 2017.

The fees relate to regulatory services, planning services and corporate administrative services and are most likely to affect businesses.

The changes will mean a number of new charges for residents of the former Guyra Shire area. In some cases the fees haven't changed at all, in some cases the fee has reduced and some have gone up massively.

The draft policy is available at the council chambers in Guyra and also on the ARC website and can be accessed via the 'Your Say' quick link .
