# **Out with** the old

Armidale Regional Council has unveiled its new branding which will be progressively rolled out over the coming months.

Touted as a strategy that will help reinvigorate local government, the new logo is already making its mark on council buildings, vehicles and communication channels.

However it could take up to six months to complete the changeover from the old branding to the new.

Consultants Kent Woodcock Creative Solutions were engaged by Council in October 2016 to develop new branding across Council's local government area, Guyra and Armidale destinations and tourism.

Administrator Dr Ian Tiley

said the new brand is modern, youthful, energetic and aspirational and tells the story of connectedness and unification within the communities of our Council area.

"As a new council created from the merger of the former Armidale Dumaresq Guyra Councils, the development of a new brand was a requirement of the merger," said Dr Tilev.

He said that the new, contemporary brand will provide a great platform for a powerful marketing program to attract more visitors and businesses to our unique region.

## Stock thefts on the rise

Stock theft is on the rise with a number of reports in the local area over the last few weeks.

New England Rural Crime Unit is currently investigating thefts in the Wongwibinda, Lyndhurst and Greenhills Rd areas.


Over 200, 2015 drop Merino Ewes went missing from the Lyndhurst area missing between February 15th and 21st. They would have had eight months wool on them and are fine wool sheep and are valued at approximately \$24,000.

They are also investigating the theft of 24 Hereford Cows near Wongwibinda which were noticed missing when their paddocks were mustered on the 11th and 12th of March. The missing cattle are all Hereford Cows between 5 and 8 years old and are valued at approximately \$43000.

Ten sheep have also been reported missing from the Greenhills Road Area south east of Guyra. The missing sheep are mixed aged ewes with some still being lambs and a crossbred poddy wether and are valued at approximately \$1000.

Investigators from the New England Rural Crime Unit are keen to speak with any person who may be able to assist with any information in relation any of the above incidents to call New England Rural Crime Investigation Unit on 67220599 or Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 or use the Crime Stoppers online reporting page.

They encourage all persons to report stock theft promptly even small numbers of stock.

# **Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale Weekly Market Report**

There was a yarding of 4980 sheep and lambs on March 15th. Numbers were reduced by 1,700 for a fair to good quality yarding of lambs. Trade lambs made up the bulk of the yarding with odd pens of heavy weights. There was also a reasonable selection of young lambs to suit the restockers.

Trade lambs were firm to \$2 cheaper, with the trade weight new season lambs selling from \$109 to \$152/head and mostly ranging between 590c and 610c/kg cwt. Trade weight old lambs sold from \$112 to \$148/head, averaging up to 630c/kg cwt. Heavy weight lambs were firm with the over 22kg 4

score new season lambs selling from \$145 to \$180/head to average 614c/kg cwt. A small pen of heavy weight White Dorper lambs sold for \$191/head. Young lambs to the restockers were \$1 to \$3 cheaper with the restockers paying from \$72 to \$121/head.

Most grades were represented in a mixed yarding of mutton. The market was strong with most grades selling at \$8 to \$10/head dearer rates. **2 score ewes** sold from \$45 to \$80 while the better **3 and 4 scores** sold from \$80 to \$119 for Merinos and \$137.50/head for crossbreds. The restockers paid to \$130/head for first cross ewes. **Merino wethers** sold to \$119/head.

#### Junior Youth Program

This is only my fourth year of living in Guyra and having begun to settle into the community, there is a strong desire to contribute it by establishing a Junior Youth (JY) program for young people aged between 12 and 15 years.

This is a period when fundamental concepts about individual and collective life are formulated in the minds of adolescents struggling to leave behind the habits of childhood. Youth at this age have much to say, and whoever treats them as children misses the opportunity to help them form a proper identity.

Developed by the Ruhi Institute from initiatives in many developing and devel-

oped countries around the world, and across all groups of young people, participation in the program assists them to analyse the forces shaping their society and to develop their capacity to have a role in contributing to building a better community and thus a better world.

Through a process of action and reflection the first elements of a gradually expanding conceptual framework within which they could deal with the complexities of life is initiated. These young people have the potential for commitment to significant social change, and empowers them to become actively involved in those areas of service with which they identify.

The program incorporates

physical activities/games across the broad creative activities some reading and discussion of stories of real events from around the world and a service component.

Training for any youth (16 to 25) who would be interested in becoming Junior Youth Animators is available without cost (apart from time), and training for child protection certification is also provided. Parents are encouraged to meet with trainers and animators and will be kept informed of activities undertaken.



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
