

Wandsworth remembers

The best crowd in many years was on hand at the Anzac Day service conducted at Wandsworth this year.

This years' service also saw the launch of a historical journal detailing the service history of those who are listed on the Wandsworth District Soldiers Memorial.

The journal was written by Greg McGuire from Gympie. A keen military historian, Greg first visited Wandsworth in 2014 with fiancé and former resident Liz Brigg (nee Watson).

Liz and her family (Mum, Dad and 13 children) emigrated to Australia from England in 1952. They were sponsored by Gabriel and Maude Ward - boosting the population of the tiny town.

The family lived in the Wandsworth Hotel - the older children were employed on surrounding farms and the younger ones boosted the school population. They stayed for around five years.

Liz first made a return visit to the area with her sister around 12 years ago and has since returned four or five times.

In 2014 she brought Greg along and he was inspired to research the history of the memorial. He has always had an interest in military history and has researched and published similar journals of war memorials in the Gympie district.

The journal lists the names of Wandsworth District men and women, detailing their service history. Despite many hours of research, records could not be located for three of those listed, F. Eggelton, Gunner A. Parsons (WW1) and A.N. Stewart (WW2). If anyone has information that could help you can contact Greg by email luw@bigpond.com

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale Market Report

There was a reduced penningon April 26th. following the public holiday and a very wet morning.

There were 4025 yarded including 1540 lambs and 2485 sheep.

The quality of the lambs was mixed with all buyers catered for. The usual buyers were in attendance however demand was weaker throughout.

The weaker demand was reflected in the market trends with all classes cheaper. The good quality restocker lambs were least affected with price reductions minimal. There was also some quality related change. Well finished heavy trade and the export weights averaged \$3 to \$9 cheaper, while light weight trade lambs were as much as \$11/head cheaper.

A fair to good quality penning of sheep attracted keen demand, especially those Merino's carrying good skin lengths. Tiley calls end to local reps

To create a fair and equitable election process at the forthcoming Armidale Regional Council Local Government elections Administrator Dr Ian Tiley has concluded the Local Representation Advisory Committee (LRAC) effective as of Tuesday May 2.

Dr Tiley said that he was aware that the majority of the members of the LRAC have indicated they will or may be

cated they will or may be candidates at the forthcoming elections in September.

"In the interest of fairness to all intending candidates it is in my view inappropriate that Committee members should have access to Council information which other candidates would not have," said Dr Tiley.

"Given that the status of members of the committee are as citizens and not councillors this I believe reinforces this view. Furthermore, and

quite naturally, some members are now in 'election mode' and in just a few weeks the Council will be in 'caretaker mode'. I therefore believe that the time is right to now conclude the Committee. I thank each Committee members for their contributions and wish them well for the future."

Former Guyra Shire Mayor Hans Hietbrink said that he is disappointed that the committee

is being disbanded.

"There are still important issues to be discussed particularly in regards to financial planning," he said. "The committee was supposed to run until the end of June and I can see no valid reason why this should not be the case."

Mr Hietbrink has indicated that he will not

Dr Ian Tiley. be standing at the upcoming election, however believes that it is 'nonsense' to say that anyone on the committee would have an advantage in the election process.

"It would be no different to sitting councillors who are able to serve up until the election is called."

Former Guyra Shire Councillor Dot Vickery has reacted to the news saying that the decision is up to Dr Tiley, while Simon Murray has said d by the meyo

that he is not surprised by the move.

"We knew that our time was almost up," Mr Murray said. "What I do regret is the lack of ability to have input into decisions and represent the views of the community."

They have both yet to decide whether they will stand at the September Council elections, and are 'leaving their options open'.

Draft 2017-2018 Fees and Charges

At the Ordinary Council Meeting held in Armidale on Wednesday 12 April 2017 the Administrator endorsed the recommendation to place the Draft 2017-2018 Fees and Charges on Public Exhibition from Thursday 13 April 2017 for a period of 28 days.

Council must review its fees and charges for the following year. The legislative requirements are outlined in the Local Government Act and Regulations.

Due to Armidale Dumaresq and Guyra Shire Councils amalgamation, there is a requirement for the many separate service fees and charges adopted by both former councils to be standardised. While many are statutory fees or charges and do not differ, there are a number of other fees and charges which have been revised and restructured. This allows fees and charges to be consistently applied throughout Armidale Regional Council as a whole. Any fee or charge duplicated across the two former councils have also been identified and removed.

If you're an expert sorter of recycling on the kerbside in Armidale or Guyra and your black bins are overflowing expect to see a gift courtesy of Armidale Regional Council and Armidale Recycling Services.

Dubbed the 'thank you' initiative council in partnership with our recycling contractor will recognise those residents who do a stellar job of sorting recycling by giving out a free recycling crate to help residents who could do with an extra crate.

Armidale Regional Council Waste Services manager James Turnell said Armidale Recycling Services staff will identify expert recyclers and give out up to 1000 crates in appreciation.

"A sticker will be placed on the free crate thanking residents and showing how much we appreciate their effort and to keep up the good work," said James Turnell.



If you're an expert sorter of recycling on the kerbside and your black bins are overflowing, expect to see a gift courtesy of Armidale Regional Council and Armidale Recycling Services.

"Depending on how well the thank you initiative is received we may look at extending the program to an annual event."

Residents can now place as many recycling crates as they require at the kerb. Simply keep paper and cardboard separate from containers and soft plastics like plastic bags. This way high quality recyclate can be generated that helps offset collection costs.

When recycling plastic bags and films please 'bag the bags', by stuffing bags and film into one bag and tying it off to avoid loose bags from blowing around. Last year our community diverted 33T of plastics bags from entering the landfill which was an absolutely tremendous effort. So thank everyone!

Better support for domestic violence victims

Victims of domestic violence will find it easier than ever before to receive support, thanks to a new initiative being rolled out across the New England Local Area Police Command, later this year.

The 'Safer Pathway' program will provide tailored, multi-agency support to victims of domestic and family violence in the region from September 2017.

The program will bring together Police, healthcare providers, Corrections, Family and Community Services and Education along with local specialist non-government domestic and family violence services, creating a streamlined, integrated referral pathway for victims who are 'at threat' or 'at serious threat' to their life, health or safety.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that the change will make it easier for victims to come forward with their story and perpetrators stopped.

"Currently, victims of domestic violence need to re-tell their experience to many government agencies, reliving the pain and abuse," Mr Marshall said. "In some circumstances, this can be a big barrier to victims coming forward to the authorities.

"Perpetrators will no longer be able to hide behind the shame that their crime can cause. Safer Pathways will ensure victims only need to tell their once - allowing for consistent and considerate information sharing, where it's appropriate.

"Through the rollout of this program in the New England LAC, police and social workers will have an additional tool at their disposal in holding perpetrators of this vile crime accountable. This will also assist the role of our hard working police, who cover a huge amount of ground in dealing with domestic violence."
