New safety barrier for preschool

The Guyra Preschool and Long Day Care Centre has received an essential safety upgrade, with the implementation of safety bollards at the front of the Centre.

Some 20 reinforced bollards have been erected between the Centre's front fence and the road to help protect the children from potential vehicle accidents.

The proximity of the playground to the road has been a key concern of Centre management and staff. Following a submission by a parent, and an organisation-wide independent safety review ordered by Armidale Regional Council, the Centre's exposure to traffic was identified as an immediate priority.

Armidale Regional Council Director of Engineering, Ralf Stoeckeler said the bollards are an important step in keeping the children who attend the Centre safe.

"The Preschool building is located between two heavily utilised intersections, and the children were potentially

exposed to danger if an accident occurred. The bollards are heavily reinforced and will help to prevent vehicles from crashing through the Preschool's front fence or building façade."


Nominated Supervisor of the Guyra Preschool and Long Day Care Centre,

"Our proximity to traffic has been a major concern for the Centre. Staff and parents are pleased to see the bollards erected, and our babies

and toddlers who utilise the front playground can now do so safely."

"Thank you to Nikki Robinson who, as a concerned parent, raised the issue with Council and assisted in initiating a solution," said Mrs Campbell.

Helping seniors to become Tech Savvy

It was a full house at the New England Community College (NECC) last Wednesday for the arrival of the Tech Savvy Seniors Bus.

Twenty five seniors were given the opportunity to improve their knowledge base and learn how to make the best use of technology.

Tech Savvy Seniors is delivered in partnership with Telstra, and was first launched in 2012. Telstra ambassadors Levi Sampson and Daniel Marriot were on hand to deliver the training, answer

questions and solve problems. NECC staff were also on hand to provide support and assistance.

Guyra was one of only 10 locations across NSW to host the Tech Savvy Seniors Roadshow. NECC has been delivering the program for the past three years, offering low cost digital training to seniors so they can develop skills and confidence to access information and services online.

The program provides training in computers, tablets and smart phones to help seniors stay connected to their families, friends and communities.

The successful program is an inititative of the NSW Aging Strategy and is funded through a partnership between the NSW Government and Telstra.

Fines for illegal firewood collection

People looking for fuel to stoke up their winter fires have been warned that collecting wood from Travelling Stock Reserves (TSRs) is illegal.

Northern Tablelands Local Land Services is issuing a timely reminder that there are no exemptions and hefty fines apply to anyone caught removing timber or disturbing either live or dead vegetation on the TSR network.

"We'd like to reiterate the message that TSRs are off limits when it comes to fire wood collection," said TSR Management Team Leader, Ross Fuller.

"We are aware of inaccurate rumours currently circulating that firewood permits are

available on TSRs. Northern Tablelands Local Land Services does not issue permits for wood collection and we want to make it very clear that removing either standing or dead timber is not allowed under any circumstances."

The stock routes not only provide a drought reserve and movement network for livestock, they are also an extremely valuable refuge for many rare and endangered native plants and animals.

Fallen logs and standing dead wood provide critical habitat for a wide range of species and need to be left in place in the natural environment. Decaying timber and leaf litter are also important in the process of nutrient recycling back in to the soil.

"The Travelling Stock Reserves are a valuable public asset, and Local Land Services is responsible for maintaining the TSR network," said Ross Fuller.

"Our staff monitor activity on the TSRs closely. Action may be taken against anyone found removing firewood or carrying out other illegal activities such as dumping rubbish or four wheel driving," said Ross.

Fines of up to \$5,500 can apply to people caught carrying out illegal activity on TSRs under the Local Land Services Act 2013.

The public are asked to report any illegal activity to Local Land Services on 1300

795 299, or to contact their local police station on 131 444.

Making a note of information such as registration numbers, descriptions, locations and dates can provide valuable assistance in the prosecution of offenders.

The TSRs are open to the public for a range of recreational activities such as fishand bush walking. However camping on TSRs is prohibited at all times unless accompanying travelling stock.


Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale Market Report

Lamb numbers remained steady at the Guyra Sheep sale on May 17, while the current market level saw grown sheep numbers increase.

The quality of the lambs was mostly good with well finished trade and heavy weights having a strong representation. Lambs suitable to the restockers were in limited supply. The usual processors were in attendance, however there were not as many restocker orders active.

Market trends varied with restocker lambs selling firm to dearer, quality not as good. The trade weight lambs sold on a firm to slightly dearer market trend also with demand remaining strong.

A good supply of very well finished heavy and extra heavy weight lambs saw a market that was mainly firm, however there were some weight related price reductions.



There were varying trends in the sheep market where good clean Merino skins were a feature. Heavy Merino wethers sold on a firm market trend, while the heavy crossbred ewes were cheaper.

Light and medium weight Merino sheep experienced little change in the market trend with some weight related price change also.



Ageing timber bridges to be replaced

A major project worth more than \$4 million to replace and upgrade the region's timber bridges has been supported by the Stronger Regions Assessment Panel and approved by Armidale Regional Council.

Council Administrator Dr Ian Tiley said the project was great news for communities across the region - and for everyone utilising local roads.

"Many of the 33 timber bridges across the region are showing signs of age and deterioration. In some cases, the timber decking is no longer able to safely carry heavy vehicles," Dr Tiley said.

"Some of the bridges have been replaced in recent years. The former Guyra Shire Council was particularly good at maintaining momentum on their program of bridge restoration.

"However there are currently at least 11 bridges in

Armidale Regional Council local government area recognised as being in poor condition. Assessment of bridges is underway and the names of bridges to be prioritised will be announced in due course."

Member for Northern Table-

lands Adam Marshall commended Council on its commitment to phasing out timber bridges across the region.

"Ageing timber bridges represent both a substantial cost and significant liability to councils," Mr Marshall said.

"The load limiting of a bridge or the complete failure means the closure of a road, which causes a huge headache for travellers and extra cost for producers. These upgrades will mean peace of mind for Council and residents."

Dr Tiley said the bridge replacement program was one of several major projects announced in the first round of projects supported by the Stronger Communities Assessment Panel.

The estimated cost of the proposed bridge upgrades is \$4.2 million. More than \$2.1 million of the Stronger Regions Fund has been quarantined for the project.

Council hopes to secure the remainder of the funding through the Australian Government's Bridges Renewal Program to maximise the number of old timber bridges that are replaced.

Securing Guyra's Water

Plans to bolster Guyra's inadequate water storage are moving forward well, with a Malpas Dam pipeline confirmed as the best option in the new business case.

I'm now arranging a meeting between Armidale Regional Council and NSW Government Ministers, to help provide funding for this important project.

A pipeline from Malpas Dam to Guyra's Water Treatment Plant will increase the total water storage to 741Ml a year, enough to meet the community's needs for decades of sustainable growth.

A modern main street will help attract travellers to the town, bringing money into the local economy. Having the highway just a stone's throw away from town is a tremendous asset and this major redevelopment will ensure the town is able to make the most of it.
