

Dot Vickery will not be in the running for a spot on the new Armidale Regional Council when the elections are held.

Dot served two terms as a Councillor with Guyra Shire and was also a member of the Local Representation Advisory Committee (LRAC) which was formed following the amalgamation.

However, she now believes that she is at her used by date and has decided that she will not be standing for election in September.

Instead she will be throwing her support behind fellow Guyra Shire Councillor Simon Murray and has joined him in calling for others to come forward and represent the area on the new council.

"My time in local government started when I was having coffee with a solicitor and I was complaining about a council decision," Dot said.

"His reply was 'if you haven't made the effort and stood for Council or been on Council, you don't have the right to criticize Council decisions'."

"Henceforth I stood next

election and have served two (mainly enjoyable) terms as a Councillor."

Reflecting on her time with Council she said that one of the necessary items on the table was the upgrade of sewerage and electricity in the main street and repairs to the footpath and roadway.

"We spent much time over

the years with consultation and planning of these items."

"However finance was always the big problem and grants were searched for without much luck. We are now going to have this necessary work occur in the near future."

Dot believes that decisions made by councils should be the best outcome for the community as a whole and not politically negotiated.

"I would like to thank all the people who have supported me over the last eight years," she said. "Please think about representing us as we need new blood and ideas for our future."

Aged Care Facility on-track for September completion

The new \$6.5 million Guyra Aged Care Facility remains on schedule for completion in September, with more than 70 per cent of construction finished.

The brand new 32-bed facility will replace the existing Kolora Hostel, which faced ongoing building compliancy issues, and will facilitate the delivery of high-quality aged care to the Guyra Community.

The framing and roofing has been completed for the entire facility, and the northern end of the facility is at 'lock-up' stage with the installation of services completed and plastering underway.

Armidale Regional Council Group Leader for Services, Mark Piorkowski, said he is pleased with the quality of the construction and the progress of the proj-

ect.

"The construction of the new Guyra Aged Care Facility is on schedule and, with almost three quarters of the construction complete, our focus is now on the final stages of making this facility one which supports bestpractice aged care delivery.

"Armidale Regional Council is proud to be able to deliver this facility to the Guyra Community on schedule and on budget due to extensive pre-commencement planning, and a number of efficiencies that have been identified throughout the construction process.

"The use of a pre-fab, concrete-filled fire wall, and changing the electrical system to run underground instead of overhead are some examples of how efficiencies have been achieved and scheduling has remained on-track", he said.

Service Leader of Community and Customer Services, Krista Schmidt, said the new facility will feature light-filled rooms, landscaped courtyards, a direct undercover access point to the Guyra MPS, a café and state-of-theart equipment.

"Armidale Regional Council has engaged extensively with the Guyra Aged Care Advisory Committee and the Kolora Project Control Group to ensure that the needs of residents are met within the facility, and to ensure the transition that process for residents is managed effectively and sensitively", said Mrs Schmidt.

Construction of the facility is due to be completed in early September 2017.

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale Market Report



There was a yarding of 3500 lambs and 1525 sheep at the Guyra sheep sale on Wednesday June 7th. Lamb numbers were up, while sheep numbers remained steady. The quality and condition of the lamb offering was generally very good, heavy weights made up a large percentage of the offering with limited supplies of trade weights and plain condition light weights. The usual processors were in attendance, however restockers were less able to purchase due to a lack of numbers.

The quality of the heavy lambs, combined with increased demand, resulted in a dearer trend for the heavy and extra heavy weight lambs. The trend was \$3 to \$5/head dearer. Well finished trade weights also experienced a dearer trend with restockers actively pursuing better quality lambs in forward condition. As a result the lambs purchased by restockers were also dearer.

Once again there was a good supply of Merino sheep in full wool and forward to well finished condition. Shorn Merino sheep were also well supplied with vendors taking advantage of the strong wool market. Demand remained strong with the market trend generally firm.

Dedication to primary industry education rewarded with OAM

Guyra grazier Brian Marshall has been awarded an Order of Australia Medal (OAM) for his service to primary industry education.

He has spent the past 22 years as an educator, teaching the principles of Holistic Management to people across Australia and also across the world.

For fourteen of those years he has called Guyra home, practising the decision making process that is at the core of his chosen way of managing his land.

Brian doesn't like to talk about himself and is uncomfortable to be thrust into the spotlight, but he is pleased to see the practise now being taught at Diploma level in the TAFE system.

He is also pleased that new educators are being trained allowing him to slow down and hand over the baton to others.

"Holistic Management is about making decisions to-

wards your unique situation that result in better land conditions, more profitability and happier people," Brian said. "

"Not everbody gets it, but

the people who do get it don't look back," he said. "I like to think that it has a positive effect, helping people get on with the business of managing their land."

Reduce hazards with prudent pruning and planting

The cooler months are an ideal time to prune and plant but Essential Energy is reminding homeowners to think carefully about the distance of vegetation from electrical assets before pulling on the gardening gloves.

Regional Manager Northern, Mark Summers, said the mature height of trees and bushes should be considered when planting on your property.

"All trees should be planted at least 15 metres, or a distance equal to their fully-grown height, away from powerlines and poles," Mark said. "Avoid planting trees, shrubs or bushes around substation transformers as this can hinder access or affect underground equipment through root entanglement or damage.

"If there is a risk debris could fall across powerlines or if vegetation is less than three metres away from poles or wires, don't attempt pruning and lopping - contact Essential Energy on 13 20 80 to arrange an inspection."

Essential Energy advises green thumbs that electricity can jump or arc across an open space and trees will conduct electricity through them.

"When using ladders and pruning equipment around the yard, keep well clear of overhead powerlines," Mark said.

"It takes less than a second for electricity to pass from a powerline through an object to a person, so never attempt to remove a tree or branch in contact with them."

If you come across a fallen powerline, stay at least eight metres away from it or fences or trees that it may be in contact with, and immediately contact Essential Energy on 13 20 80.

Discover what drones can do

GLENRAC is bringing an insight to new technology with two events focussed on. These events, at will provide landholders with information about what drones are, how to use them, what rules and regulations apply and how they can be valuable to a farming or grazing enterprise.

Ben Watts, Bracla.com, has more than 20 years' experience in delivering training across rural Australia. He has recently developed an interest in drones and established a training package to assist people to formulate ideas about how drones can assist their agricultural enterprise and to understand the safe and effective use of Remotely Piloted Aircraft.

Russel Smith from New England Weeds Authority can speak from experience as to how they are using drones in New England landscapes to reduce the labour and vehicle costs in monitoring weed infestations and the effectiveness of control programs. These workshops will give an introduction to what drones can do and their role in agriculture.

Affordable housing now in reach

NORTHERN Tablelands MP Adam Marshall has welcomed a new package of State Government reforms designed to make housing more accessible to homebuyers across the state, by significantly reducing stamp duty and encouraging investment from young people.

Mr Marshall said that those living in rural and regional areas would be some of the biggest beneficiaries of today's announcement.

"While we're very fortunate to be living in country NSW, with significantly cheaper housing and cost of living than our city cousins, saving up for your first home is still a challenge for many," Mr Marshall said. "All stamp duty on existing and new homes up to \$650,000 will be abolished – which covers the vast majority of homes in our region.

"Also, there will be stamp duty concessions on properties of up to \$800,000.

"First home buyers across the Northern Tablelands will now save more than \$11,000 on average in stamp duty, which will significantly reduce the upfront cost of their home.

"This will help young people saving up for their first home in the Northern Tablelands, without impacting on the existing value of homes, which for many families is their primary investment. The measures also abolish the stamp duty charged on lenders mortgage insurance, which can cost first homebuyers with limited deposits up to \$2,900.

"All these changes will advantage locals – with the foreign investor surcharge doubling, we expect to see Australians increasingly competitive when homes go up for auction. Australians looking to buy a house should come first, not foreign investors," Mr Marshall said.

"There's no silver bullet to housing affordability, but this extensive package will make the goal of home ownership that much easier for young people in our region."
