Shear excellence for local lads

Shearing is a way of life for Jeremy Newberry. So much so that on weekdays you will find him earning his living in the shed and on weekends you will more often than not find him competing on the show circuit.

His efforts have been rewarded with success at the State finals in Dubbo, taking the NSW title in the Open Circuit Shear.

Jeremy will now go on to contest the National titles which will take place in Bendigo in October.

Fellow Guyra shearer Luke Foster finished fourth and was unlucky to miss a spot at the Nationals with only the first three able to proceed.

The road to the National Shearing Championship starts out as a competition at local shows, with 21 shows across the State holding their own local competitions. The aim is to accumulate points, with the six highest point scorers

then selected to shear off at the Dubbo Show.

Originally from Glen Innes, Jeremy has been shearing around Guyra for about 8 years and moved here in 2015 to cut back on the travel. He enjoys the competition and particularly the friendly rivalry with his cousin Daniel McIntyre who has been NSW champion for the last 10 years.

"Daniel is a good shearer

and I've been trying to get the better of him for years and also make the NSW team. This year things went my way," Jeremy said.

"I'm not sure how I will get on at the Nationals - being the first one it will be totally different.

"There is a lot of sheep to be shorn between now and then and I will be getting plenty of practice in."

Away from the Show circuit, he averages 200 sheep

a day in sheds around the New England. He enjoys the shearing lifestyle but says that it is a dying trade.

"There is a terrible shortage of shearers, but it is a job I would recommend any young person to take up.

"It can be hard on the body but after a while you get used to the work and it keeps you fit and money is good if you are willing to have a go."

Jasmin was selected after a competitive application process where she demonstrated her passion and willingness to learn and promote the breed.

Her involvement with Angus Youth began when she was just 10 years old. Since then she has competed in several Angus Youth National Roundups whilst also showing her own cattle and competing at judging events at local and state competitions.

With the Forum being held over a period of two weeks Jasmin said that it is all business and there is an action packed program lined up.

"There is really quite a variety of things - it starts with the conference where I hope



to learn more about what different countries do in their breed societies and how they run their youth programs," she said.

"Then we will do a few trips including the National Highland Show and we will compete in a farm challenge

Jasmin has a commercial flock of Red Angus Cattle and is starting to move more into Black Angus. In the future she hopes to one day have her own stud, combining the best of both breeds.

"They support the club in many ways, including allowing us to sell raffle tickets in store and assisting with donations," Mr King said. "The award recognizes the behind the scenes support they provide."

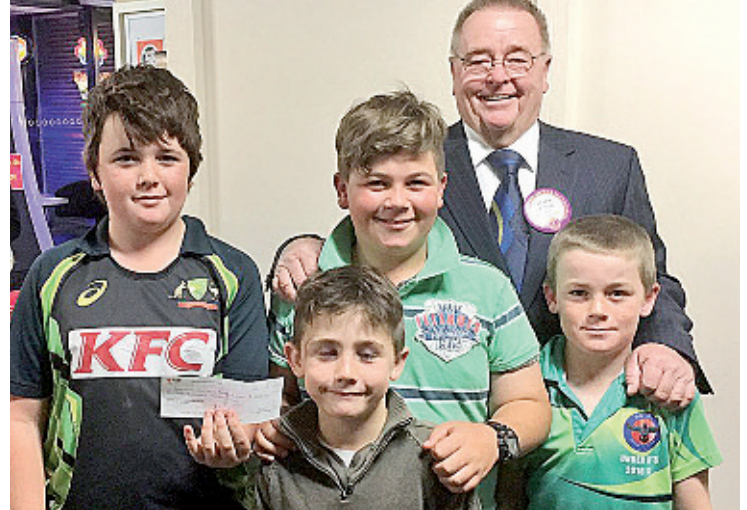

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Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale Market Report

June 14th - There was a reduction in lamb numbers, while the sheep remained steady. Well finished heavy weight lambs were well represented in a mixed quality penning. Lambs suitable for restocking and finishing purposes were limited in supply. The usual buyers were in attendance.

Demand for well finished lambs was weaker, resulting in cheaper trends through both the trade and heavy weights. Weight reductions through the heavy and extra heavy weights also had an effect on average prices. Restocker lambs were well supported with the market



trend firm to slightly cheaper.

Market trends were firm to cheaper through the sheep sale. A greater percentage of Merino sheep carrying in a long skin accounted for average price increases in some classes. Carcase prices may vary due to long Merino skins being processed differently in some facilities.

Weekly Wool Market Report

June 16th - After showing signs of a recovery on the final day of selling last week the market opened strongly and built up a head of steam as the week progressed. The relatively small national offering combined with renewed buyer interest helped push all types higher with the main focus being on the fine to medium Merino microns.

The 21 micron indicator closed the week at its highest level in over two decades eclipsing its early May high point and also the high point set back in June 2011. The 22 micron indicator also closed the week in uncharted territory. 26,788 bales were sold nationally with a passed in rate of 6.3%. Major buyers included Fox & Lillie, Techwool and Aust Merino Exporters. In a positive for next week, the Fremantle market finished the week

higher than the East coast for selected micron categories, which is an uncommon scenario. Upcoming weekly offerings remain relatively low with a slight jump in the numbers available for the first sale of the new season. A little more activity was also witnessed in forward markets this week with the 19 micron contract trading as far out as March 2019 albeit at a hefty discount.

Next Week's Sale

24,376 bales are expected to be on offer nationally with 9,948 in Sydney.

One-off payment of up to \$75 for pensioners

Many people in the New England Electorate are amongst 3.8 million people nationally to benefit from a one-off payment of up to \$75 to help with energy costs.

The Energy Assistance Payment will be provided to people on the Age Pension, Disability Support Pension and Parenting Payment Single as well as Veterans and their partners who receive the Service Pension, Income Support Supplement and relevant compensation payments.

The one-off payment is \$75 for singles and \$62.50 for each pensioner in a couple. It will be automatically paid to eligible recipients over the next two weeks.

Deputy Prime Minister and Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce, that this one-off payment was part of a sensible and reasonable package to secure significant reform through the Senate to reduce company tax rates to businesses with a turnover of up to \$50 million.

"In securing the passage of the company tax cuts, which help more than 3.2 million small and medium sized businesses employing 6.5

million people, invest more, employ extra staff and pay higher wages, the Government also committed to these one-off payments."

The payment will not be taxed, will not be treated as income for tax purposes and does not count as income for social security purposes.

In addition, about 657 part-pensioners in the New England Electorate will have their Pensioner Concession Card reinstated.

"Some former part-pensioners were no longer able access some state/territory government, local government and private sector benefits following the discontinuation of their entitlements to a Pensioner Concession Card as part of the sensible reforms to the pension assets test which commenced at the start of this year," Mr Joyce said.

"It's great to see that these people will have their card reinstated and be able to continue to access the same benefits they previously had through the Pensioner Concession Card."

The Pensioner Concession Card will be automatically provided to eligible former part-pensioners in October.

Paid parking at Armidale Airport

Call to hold off decision until after election

Guyra grazier Robert Gordon believes that the proposed introduction of paid parking at Armidale Regional Airport will adversely affect residents who live farthest from the facility.

Armidale Regional Council are calling for submissions into the proposal which would see a fee introduced for overnight parking at the airport. The deadline for submissions closes this Friday, June 23.

Mr Gordon is urging rural residents to have their say before it is too late. He is also calling on the final decision to be delayed until after the September council elections to allow more time for the issue to be fully explored and also to allow more people to have input.

Mr Gordon is a member of the Armidale Airport Users Group and also an active member of the Guyra ANTY group and he believes that rural people will be disadvantaged if paid parking is implemented.

"If you are outside the city

boundaries in places like Guyra or any of the smaller villages in the area, you don't have the luxury of taking a taxi to the airport or getting a family member to drop you off," he said.

"There needs to more ground work done to explore the real impacts of paid parking, rather than taking the easy way of slugging the public. -

"For a lot of us there is no alternative but to leave our cars at the airport while we travel whether it be for business or pleasure."

"There is also a real need to quantify exactly who is taking up the parking spaces. There is speculation that congestion is being caused by people who use the airport as a meeting spot to car pool, rather than by those who are actually travelling by air," he said.

"More time is needed and we need to get some basic figures about who is using the airport. If it is being used as a pickup and drop-off point during the day,

then implementing overnight parking charges will have little impact and instead will adversely affect the legitimate users."

As a member of the Airport Users Group, Mr Gordon recognises that parking at the airport needs to be addressed, but believes the decision is being rushed. He is calling on administrator Ian Tiley to delay the final decision until after the election.

"The proposal for paid overnight parking is highly discriminatory and more time is needed for other options to be discussed," Mr Gordon said.

"This decision should be made by elected representatives who have considered all the options."

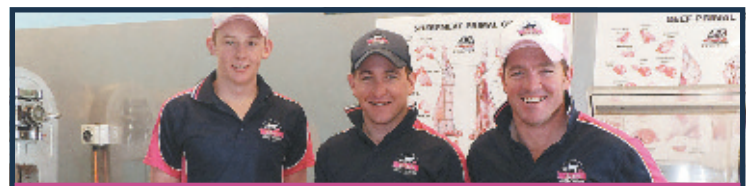
Great news for school canteen

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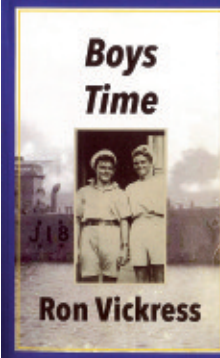

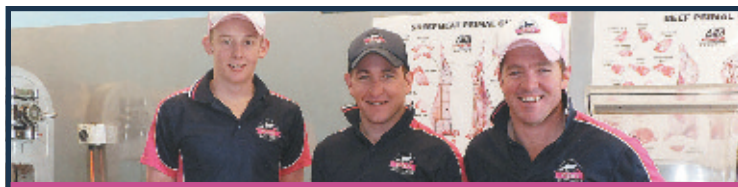
