Bigger and better

Extensions to the Guyra Medical Centre are now complete and an official ceremony was held on Tuesday to mark the occasion. The \$260,000 upgrade includes extensions to the waiting room and new consultation rooms.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall was joined by Hunter New England Health's Executive Director Rural and Regional Health Services Susan Heyman and representatives of the Rotary Club of Guyra at the opening of the project.

A substantial portion of the funding was raised by the community, with money originally slated for the failed helipad project being diverted to the extensions. President of Rotary Jenny Cumming has thanked the Guyra Community for all their support with this project.

"Originally it started off as a Helipad Project and everybody jumped in behind it, which was fabulous," Jenny said. "A lot of clubs and also individuals contributed."

"We consulted with all our major donors, including Costa's who were a major

benefactor, before agreeing to transfer the funds.

"They were all more than happy for the money to come across and we hope that the community is happy with the decision."

The Guyra Hospital Auxiliary also made a substantial donation and President Di Burey said they were happy to see the money used for the

Medical Centre.

Guyra GP Dr. Jey has praised the new facility which he said is a great improvement on the old medical centre in which he first started in Guyra.

"The building in Bradley St was really not suitable for winter in Guyra," Dr. Jey said. "We had a lot of practical difficulties running the practice in

the old building. This new facility and now the new extensions are fabulous."

"It is good to see how small communities can work together and get these wonderful facilities. It's a great facility and Guyra is a great community to work in."

The NSW government contributed around \$220,000 to the project.

Weekly Wool Market Report

The headline market indicators at plus a cent or two would normally indicate a very stable market however it was a tale of two very different markets this week. It was a designated Superfine sale in Sydney and the finer the micron the greater the demand, whilst the medium micron Merino types and the Crossbreds sector came under downward pressure.

Lower vegetable matter finer Skirting's were driven higher as was the Merino Carding indicator. 43,026 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 6.0%.

Major buyers included Seatech, Tianyu and Techwool. Forward prices indicate a

solid market even into the New Year. 50 cent discounts to the current physical are being applied however given the current level of the physical these discounts appear reasonable.

Weekly auction offerings look set to remain between 40 and 45,000 bales in the short term. With over 55,000 additional bales offered compared to the same period last season the wool market has performed admirably as the Northern indicator closed the week just 22 cents short of the mid-August high.

Kooralbyn - a wonderful time to visit

On November 11th & 12th four local gardens will be open to the public as a fundraiser for St Mary of the Angels and Kolara Aged Care Facility. Kooralbyn, The Old Manse, Old Belmont and Hillside will open to the public in what will be a rare opportunity to visit these beautiful gardens. This week we take a look at Kooralbyn the garden of Robyn and Bryan Jackson (70 Starr Road)

The garden at "Kooralbyn" is set on two acres, on the western edge of town.

Owner Robyn Jackson said that the garden has evolved over the last thirty years with some boundary extensions.

"Kooralbyn" features many trees, along with herbaceous borders, unusual shrubs and flower beds edged with the local basalt column rock.

In the shaded areas of the garden you will find with camellias, rhododendrons, hellebores, hydrangeas and azaleas.

The sunny areas have beds of penstemons and salvias, interplanted with roses and iris. Here there are many other plants that are interesting to garden visitors as well. There are places to sit and smell not only the roses, but many other flowering plants.

One large raised garden contains more than sixty herbaceous peonies, while there are tree peonies with huge jewel-like flowers dotted around the garden.

A vegetable garden and fruit trees are additions to the garden, and the produce is appreciated by family and friends.

ANTY - This means all out war

After huge swings against the State Coalition Government in the recent bi-elections in Cootamundra, Murray and Blacktown, the Berejiklian Government is still hell-bent on ignoring the majority voice in relation to forced council amalgamations brought about by the "Fit for the Future" so-called Reform Package slammed on Local Government by the Baird and Toole totalitarian rule; borne out of Liberal top end policy some years ago. Now that this government has rejected a Bill in the Lower House which would have given communities whose city and regional councils who have been forcibly amalgamated the right to say whether they wanted their council back, proves that they (the government) are prepared to tough it out and totally disregard their constituents.

As far as the Save Guyra ANTY group is concerned this means all-out war. This Berejiklian government is clearly fearful of the people's

views and want to dominate them. They are not prepared or totally refuse to listen to communities. They have declared war on local government across the State, we need to stand above this and fight for our democratic right to control our own destiny at grass-roots local level.

The massive swings against the long held Nat's seats of Cootamundra and Murray in the recent bi-election illustrates the complete dissatisfaction of the communities in forcibly amalgamated councils. It beggars belief that the Premier's Department have stated that this swing was quite normal and wasn't seen as a problem for the coalition, just another throw away statement from a government ignoring the will of the people. The Bill supported by all political parties and independents except the Liberal/National Party was passed in the Upper House back in June, but has been defeated in the Lower House by Liberal and National members including

our member Adam Marshall. The fact that our local MP refused to cross the floor or abstain to ensure it passes in the Lower House has made it blindingly obvious that Marshall has no intention of representing his regional constituents in Northern Tablelands.

It is essential that we keep Local Government truly local and there has to be fair and proper referendums when mergers or DEMERGERS are considered. If this government continues on its current stance on these vitally important issues they are doomed to failure. With the Labor opposition committing to reinstating Guyra Shire Council in writing signed by Labor leader Luke Foley and Local Government Shadow Minister Peter Primrose if elected to government at the 2019 State elections, perhaps its' time for a change if we want to return to our democratic rights.
