Guyra Bull tops National Show

The Morgan family is celebrating a win for their stud at the recent North Coast National Show. Coolibah Magnum was awarded the all-breeds supreme champion stud beef exhibit at the event, making him the best of 21 breeds at the Lismore show.

On his way to the top award he took out the Champion Junior Bull, Champion Bull, Champion Simmental Exhibit and Champion Interbreed Bull.

Coolibah Magnum, is a 15month-old Simmental bull who had a less than perfect start to life. Born in the middle of winter last year with snow on the ground at Sandy and Gary Morgan's property, the newborn calf received a fright when Sandy went out to check on cows. His beginning was almost his end, as he bolted for a nearby dam, with Sandy in pursuit.

"I took off my gum boots, beanie and jacket and went in after him but couldn't find him," Sandy said. "Then I felt him with my feet, pulled him out of the freezing water by his back legs, banged him on the chest and after about 10 minutes he sat up.

After a less than inglorious start, the young bull has gone on to be a star on the Show cir-

cuit. He took out broad ribbons at this year's Guyra and Inverell Shows at only sevenmonths-old on his way to Lismore and the Simmental feature show.

Judges Stephen Hayward (Allora), Richard Duddy (Tamworth) and Kelly Runzer (Goondiwindi) abandoned the regular pointscore system in favour of a discussion which saw Magnum triumph as their all-breeds star. The judges described the Simmental bull as "perfect".

He was not their only success at Lismore with Coolibah Maisy taking out the champion Junior Heifer, while the stud also placed first in the Pair of Bulls and Breeders Group.

Malpas pipeline a 'game changer'

There are some great opportunities in store for the Guyra region, with the proposed Malpas Dam pipeline being a game changer in terms of attracting new development, according Mayor Simon Murray.

He believes that more horticultural projects could be on the cards, and water security is the only thing holding them back.

"The pipeline from Malpas is the best option for a more secure future for Guyra's water supply," Cr Murray said.

"Projections done by council staff showed that raising the current dam wall would only provide security for 15 years before deficits would again become evident."

Cr Murray said that cost difference between raising

the wall (\$10m) and pipeline (\$12.8m) is relatively small.

The pipeline would connect Malpas Dam with the Guyra Water Treatment plant and take around 18 months to construct.

A funding announcement is expected shortly and Council has called for Expressions of Interest for construction of the pipeline.

"There is money currently

on offer by the State government for infrastructure funding and we need to take advantage of this while it is on the table as it may not be around in the future," Cr Murray said.

"The balance of the funding would come from the Federal government and with no financial input from council."

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale **Market Report**

November 15th - There were increased numbers in the lamb sale, while sheep supplies more than doubled. The quality of the lambs was fairly mixed with an increased supply of early new season lambs and Merinos were well supplied.

There was a great deal of variation in the condition of both the crossbred and Merino lambs. The regular orders were in place and there was reasonable restocker demand for the plainer condition Merinos.

Market trends through the young lambs were generally firm, however with the increased numbers there was a greater variation in both weight and quality. There was also little change in the mar-

ket for trade weight crossbred old lambs. The well finished Merino lambs saw prices below the previous sale, however weights were

Despite the restocker activity the plainer condition Merino lambs sold to a cheaper trend. Heavy and extra heavy weight old lambs saw a firm to dearer market trend. Well finished grown sheep sold strongly to processors with the market recording a firm trend. There was little change in the market for plainer condition sheep. There were fewer long wool Merino sheep penned with this accounting for some price change.

Weekly Wool Market Report

The recent strong performance of the market led to an increase in this week's nationally offering. At just over 50,000 it was the largest offering in three months. Gains for most types were seen on the opening day however in the first sign of any weakness for some time there were small losses recorded on the final day. The finer types along with Merino carding's were the best performers whilst after a strong surge last week the Crossbred sector gave up ground. 49,009 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 3.2%. Major buyers included Seatech, Techwool and Tianyu with the first two buyers dominating the Merino

fleece catalogue. Next week's expected national offering has jumped to almost 49,000 bales with AWEX figures showing an 8.5% increase in the amount of wool offered nationally for the season to date. Forward market activity centered on the 19 micron indicator with around a 50 cent discount being applied to early 2018 deliveries. Considering the current record level of the 19 micron indicator this discount appears very reasonable and also shows just how strong the current demand situation is.

Ladies in Livestock groups keep growing

Women are taking the wheel with both hands when it comes to self-empowerment and education on-farm with the expansion of the Northern Tablelands Local Land Services Ladies in Livestock program. Launched in September 2016 by the Local Land Services Sustainable Ag team, the first Guyra-based meeting drew women from across the region.

The funded program, through the Australian Government's National Land-Program, delivers hands-on, practical skills to women as independent land stewards with a keen interest in agriculture, to work and make decisions on properties. To meet the growing and widespread interest, new Ladies in Livestock groups have been established and are now flourishing in Inverell, Tenterfield, and Walcha.

Northern Tablelands Local Land Services Officer Phoebe Haslett has been coordinating the Walcha group, which is already 40-strong. The group draws a diverse range of women with various experiences. Topics range widely from animal health and management, marketing options, financial planning, paddock preparation, pasture selection and identification, weed identification and biosecurity management. The program provides a supportive learning space for women who may feel less inclined to ask technical questions during mixed field days or workshops.

"This is what it's about; women supporting women. There's definitely a social aspect as well. Some ladies are quite isolated, but they all said they had come to learn, and they wanted to learn more," Phoebe said.

Each group is tailored to the majority interest and production of that district. The Ladies in Livestock groups are open to any women. Meeting frequency is decided by each group and timing is considered to allow for school runs and school holidays.

"We want to make this as accessible as possible to any lady on the land," Phoebe

Plans 'absurd'

It is absurd that the council thinks that reducing the number of car parks in the section between Moore St and Nincoola St from 16 to 4 is a great move forward. One disabled car park out the front of the pharmacy is not acceptable. Pharmacy customers require good parking and access

Lack of parking a concern

These umbrellas would be a perfect place for gangs and vandals to congregate at night and on weekends, leaving their litter, filth and graffiti in the street. Does Guyra really need this? Who would be left to clean it up? Would the ratepayers have to pay for these umbrellas? Or would this no brainer idea be forced upon them with very little use by the business or their patrons. Who would pay the insurance in case of injury? This has not been discussed with the owners of these businesses at any time, and should have been! We do agree that some seating and trees could be added, while retaining the

We are not against development however this is an opportunity to get it right. There are parts of our town which could no doubt do with some beautification, this does include Bradley Street,

These plans have been drawn up by someone who has never lived in a small town with plenty of money to spend, and has never lived in a cold climate. With suggestions from others, surely the residents of Guyra and our visitors deserve better than this. A full and frank discussion at a public meeting must be held to discuss the many concerns of the local community ASAP. The owners of these shops are ratepayers too.
