The fog of the early day lifted to a clear bright morning at Ben Lomond for the Anzac Day Service with the guest speaker this year Allen Campbell from Glen Innes.

Special guests were Anne Thrift and brother Tim Wall who presented a photo of their mother Dulcie Mary Wall to the Ben Lomond War Memorial Hall Trust management committee representative, Beth White.

The photo will be added to the collection because of her enlistment locally and her service to the Australian Women's Land Army. Like many who served little is known of her activity in the Land Army or her service contribution.

Another special guest for the morning service was Rob Williams who drove his blitz truck which dates back to World War two. Rob's ownership of this particular vehicle is a tribute to the service of members of his family who served during the war in various capacities, either deployed overseas or in rendering essential services, all of whom thankfully survived.

The survival of this 1942 Chevrolet 'blitz' is classic. The shipment was not intended to see service here because it was merely brought to Australia, en route to the Middle East. As such it is truly unique, being the only one of the four on board that survived from the bombing of Darwin Harbour. That action destroyed the other sister vehicles in the shipment.

Rob has acquired a true survivor and is justly proud of his acquisition. The management committee would like to thank him for attending theceremony and sharing the story.

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

ipation in the Elders Summer Farm Supplies Competition.

May 2nd - Two weeks since the last sale saw a decline in numbers with an even spread through the sheep and lambs. The quality of the lambs was very mixed and featured an outstanding quality pen of extra heavy weights. The usual buyers were in attendance. There was

limited southern restocker activity, with some of the locals participating.

Comparing to the previous sale the market trend saw restocker lambs sell firm to slightly cheaper with the better quality lambs least affected. The trade weight lambs also sold on a firm to slightly cheaper trend. Heavy weight lambs sold to a slightly dearer trend with exporters looking for weight and finish. The extra heavy weights remained firm along with a weight related price increase.

There was a large supply of light weight full wool Merino

ewes penned. There were limited supplies of well finished sheep available. Market trends remained close to firm with odd sales either side. There was a price reduction in the very heavy weight sheep with that being weight related.

Weekly Wool Sales

May 4th - The softer close to last week's sales continued on the first day of sales this week with a general 15-20 cent fall for most micron categories.

<u>Rural Market Reports</u>

The final day of sales witnessed a very firm market with signs of slight upward movement for some types. In a positive sign for next week's sales, Fremantle selling after the East coast had closed for the week received solid support.

Despite the falls the Eastern Market Indicator finished the week at its second highest weekly close on record. The current quality of weekly auction offerings is no doubt playing its part in the daily price fluctuations with AWEX reporting a large proportion of lower yielding poorer style types currently being offered. 40,521 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 5.3%.

Major buyers included Lempriere, PJ Morris and Tianyu with a good spread of support amongst many of the buyers. Weekly rostered quantities available are starting to decline which is normal for this time of the season. Despite the decline in the physical, forward market prices held relatively firm on the back of only a small quantity being traded.

Armidale Cattle Sale

May 3rd- There was an increase in supplies with weaners and cows again making up the bulk of the offering. Quality was very mixed and there were large numbers of plain condition cattle penned, the result of poor seasonal conditions. A single pen of well finished heavy grown steers were a standout. The usual processors attended and the usual restocker and feedlot orders were in place.

Demand varied through the young cattle with weaner steers to restockers selling to a cheaper trend of 20c to 30c/kg. Conversely, the heifer weaners in the same weight ranges sold to a dearer trend of up to 5c/kg. Vealer heifers suitable to the trade sold to a cheaper trend of up to 9c/kg on the 2 scores, with quality an issue. Heavy yearling feeder steers averaged dearer for quality on an otherwise mostly firm market trend. Medium and heavy weight yearling feeder heifers sold to dearer trend of 10c to 11c/kg, competition and quality improved.

No market comparison on the well finished heavy grown steers. Plain condition grown heifers sold to cheaper trends, while the well finished lots sold firm to slightly dearer. Plain condition cows sold to cheaper trends with the exception of some joined and PTIC lots that attracted restocker competition. The well finished heavy weight cows remained mostly firm with an isolated dearer sale.

Improvements on the way for Gun Club

Guyra Gun Club members are celebrating, with news of an almost \$8,000 grant which will allow the club to complete a much-needed upgrade of its toilet and shower block and construct disabled access toilet facilities, for the first time.

Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall visited the picturesque club grounds to announce the \$7,994 funding and discuss plans for further improve to works at the facility.

"Many visiting shooters and their families camp at the club grounds for a number of days and so these facilities are critical to keeping these large events going in our region," Mr Marshall said. "There are also a growing number of wheelchair shooters getting involved in the sport, so it's important to have proper amenities to cater for all members of the club and visitors."

Club secretary Greg Brunsdon showed Mr Marshall plans to expand camping options at the club grounds, including building

an additional amenities block at the northern end of the club facility and extending power outlets for camper vans and caravans

"I look forward to working again with the club to obtain funding from the state government to continue to improve facilities, which will benefit our region," Mr Marshall said.

Draft Revenue Policy on Public Exhibition

At the Ordinary Council Meeting held in Armidale on Thursday 26 April 2018 Council endorsed the Public Exhibition of the Draft Revenue Policy (Parts A & B) 2018-2019 from Monday 30 April to Monday 28 May 2018.

The Local Government Act 1993 requires a Statement of Council's Revenue Policy be included in the Operational Plan. The Revenue Policy includes the following statements for the 2018-2019 year:

• Part A – Fees and Charges

• Part B – Ordinary Rates, Annual Charges, Statement of Proposed Borrowings, GST implications, interest on Overdue Rates and Charges

The amount that Councils in NSW can increase rates is limited by a rate peg set by the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) each year. For the 2018/2019 financial year Council's general income may be increased by 2.3 percent. The rate peg applies to general income in total, and not to individual ratepayers' rates. Councils can determine how to allocate this increase between different ratepayer categories. Individual rates are also affected by other factors, such as land valuations and the four year rate freeze protection period. General Income comprises income from ordinary rates and special rates only. It does not include income from waste management service charges, water and sewerage services charges.

Fees and charges are the user pay charges Council applies to services it provides to the community, such as water usage, development applications, library fees, hall fees etc. The community is invited to make submissions in regard to the Draft Revenue Policy – Part A - Fees and Charges 2018-2019 and Part B - Ordinary Rates and Charges 2018-2019. Rail Reality Check

The 2016-17 annual report for NSW Trains, which operates the country rail network, states that the annual operating expenses were \$809,661,000. Income from passenger services was \$116,367,000 – about one sixth of the operating costs. This shows that the Government will operate rail services if one sixth of operating costs can be recovered from ticket sales. It gives us a benchmark for rail viability that we can apply to an Armidale-Guyra rail service. There are 2,386 km of operating rail lines in country NSW, so the per kilometre share of annual operating expenses to be recovered from passengers is \$48,771. With 43 km of rail line from Armidale to Guyra, a viable service would need to recover \$2,097,142 from ticket sales each year.

How many rail passenger trips and what ticket price would we need to do this? According to the Transport for NSW "Train Statistics 2014", the annual total of passenger-trips on the Armidale-Tenterfield TrainLink bus service was 9,479. Assuming that Armidale-Guyra trips comprise one fifth of this figure, we would have 1,896 passenger-trips over which to spread the passenger share of operating costs of a rail service. This gives \$1,106 for a one-way ticket.

Can we get more people on the trains to bring the ticket price down? According to the 2016 Census, 591 people in Guyra travel to work by car. If we assume that one fifth of these are driving to Armidale for work, then we have 118 potential daily commuters on the train. If we have these commuters travelling to work 231 days a year, and shift the annual 1,896 bus trips on to the train as well, this gives us 56,504 train passenger trips over which to spread the passenger share of operating costs. The oneway ticket price then reduces to \$37, about seven times the fuel cost to do the trip by car. The annual travel cost for a Guvra-Armidale train commuter would be \$17,742.

But wait – would tourists on the train reduce the ticket price? It works out that to get the ticket price down to a reasonable \$5.00 one-way, we would need 208,707 tourists doing the Armidale-Guyra return trip each year. To put this in context, the Elvis Festival in Parkes attracts about 6,000 visitors each year.

The signs on the trees say that Guyra needs trains and, of course, it would be wonderful to see the trains running again. But the reality is that a train service to Guyra would take around \$2million out of the local economy each year, paying for train trips that could be done at a fraction of the cost by car or bus. *Ian Reeve*
