# Expansion plans for Costa

The Costa Group have announced a further expansion of their glasshouse operations in Guyra.

At the August meeting of the Costa Board, approval was given for the construction of a further 10ha glasshouse for snacking tomato production.

Capital expenditure for the project will be \$67m with production expected to ramp up from May 2020, employing a further 150 people.

The expansion will also encompass expansion in nursery capacity and enhanced packing capability across total of 40 ha of tomato production.

Guyra based MLC Scot MacDonald said that this foreshadowed expansion is a vote of confidence in the industry and Guyra.

"We have the right factors here that make glasshouse horticulture viable and this sector will only increase in the future," Mr MacDonald

"I think we need to strongly promote these advantages and seek further investment in other greenhouse com-

modities around Guyra.

"We have shown it can be done in harmony with the community and other industries.

"The Guyra Chamber of Commerce, Armidale Regional Council and Adam Marshall MP continue to back these developments and that is important for a strong diversified economy in Guyra."

Costa began producing tomatoes in Guyra in 2004 with a five-hectare glasshouse built in Elm St.

Production on this site eventually expanded to 20 ha, and in 2015 Costa commissioned a new 10ha glasshouse on land to the north of Guyra.

This site was configured for

future expansion and the additional 10ha will provide further growth capacity for snacking tomatoes.

It is planned that the site will continue to be self-sufficient, with water capture and recycling sources meeting all requirements.

A stand by bore is able to be utilised in the event of exceptionally dry conditions.



# Access to treated water for farming families

Armidale Regional Council is making available access to town water for farmers needing assistance during the drought. Members of the community living on the land can now access small volumes of town water all hours via the truck wash behind the north Guyra road house and the truck wash located at the Armidale sale yards.

To be eligible to access the water your property must be classified within the 'farmland' category on your rates assessment. To apply for an AVData account, come in person to the Armidale or Guyra Civic Administration Buildings, bringing with you your rates assessment. Once

your token is activated (usually the same day) you can swipe it at either of the water access points. You must bring your own hose with a one inch threaded fitting.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Cr Simon Murray said he hoped this would assist farming households who maybe running low on household water.

"We haven't experienced any significant rain in our region for over six months and household water supplies would be extremely low," said Cr Murray. "If we can make it a little easier for farming families to access treated water for drinking, showering and general household use it will be one less issue to deal with on the farm."

Residents who are experiencing genuine financial hardship can contact Council for consideration to enter into a payment plan under Council's Hardship Policy. # Facelift for Museum underway

The Guyra Museum has been a hive of activity over recent weeks, with work in full swing to refurbish the building inside and out.

The work is being carried out thanks to \$60,000 grant from the NSW Cultural fund, with support also coming from Armidale Regional Council and the Guyra Historical Society.

The major work being carried out includes repainting of the building inside and out and refurbishment of the flooring.

Repairs will also be made

to the toilets and kitchen as well as the side and back doors.

Local contractors have been employed to carry out the work, with a completion date expected towards the end of the year.

It has been a major logistical exercise for the Historical Society with some of the museum's collection being housed in a shipping container while the work is being carried out.

Further work will include cataloguing the whole collection and the establishment of a research space and storage room at Guyra Library. The total estimated cost of this project is \$107,500.

The upgrading of the Museum is expected to enhance the cultural opportunities in Guyra and district, giving local residents, tourists and school children a local cultural and educational experience.

When work is complete, they hope to reopen the museum to the public and extend their opening hours to cater for visitors.

# Otitis Media Awareness Day

Does your child suffer from earaches, have frequent colds and flu, say "What?" a lot, have poor speech or trouble concentrating at home and school? They could be suffering from otitis media, or disease of the middle ear.

On Tuesday 18th September, Guyra will host an OTITIS MEDIA (middle ear disease) awareness day at the Guyra Public Library from 10.00am until 4.30pm

Free ear health checks will be available on the day for children between 2-12 years old. Health checks will be provided by audiometry nurses from Armidale Community Health and Armajun Aboriginal Health Service of Inverell. Information about Otitis Media and the associated conductive hearing loss will be available from the Conductive Hearing Loss Teacher of the NSW Depart-

ment of Education.

Otitis Media means disease of the middle ear and includes middle ear fluid, ear infections and 'glue ear'. It may affect up to 30% of children in Kindergarten at any time. It often goes unnoticed but the child cannot hear their teacher or peers clearly.

Over 90% of all preschool and school aged children will suffer from at least one episode of otitis media. Many children will have repeat episodes. Information from Australian Hearing shows that in total, an average of 3 months schooling will be affected by otitis media. For an indigenous child that will extend to a total of three years.

Each episode of otitis media can last 4-6 weeks which equates to half a school term! It can result in reduced hearing, leading to problems with learning and

delayed development of speech, language and social skills.

Recurring episodes of otitis media may lead to behaviour problems simply because the children cannot hear instructions clearly over an extended period of time.

The aim of OMAD is to catch otitis media early and reduce the chances of long term damage to hearing and learning. Simple steps can be used by parents and children to combat the problem such as teaching your child to blow their nose and to wash their hands to minimise the spread of germs.

Craft and colouring activities will be provided for those waiting and a show bag is available for children who complete their ear health check.

### See the REAL Machine Gun Preacher

Sam Childers 'The Machine Gun Preacher' will be at Guyra Central School on Tuesday September 11th.

Mr Childers, a former bikie who transformed his life, will share his story of redemption. His incredible story has taken him from a life of violent crime to war torn eastern Africa where he has rescued over 1500 children from rebel armies.

His story starts with being an armed guard for drug dealers and turning his life around in 1998 after almost being killed in a wild brawl. Since then, Sam has built one of the largest orphanages in Southern Sudan, which has fed and housed more than a 1,000 chil-

With the orphanage finished, Childers began to lead armed missions to rescue children from the Lord's Resistance Army - which led to villagers calling him 'The Machine Gun Preacher'. Local organizer Dan McGinty said they are encouraging local people to attend the event.

"Sam Childers was a guy with no hope and no future, so

a story like his will be inspiring and encouraging to people that's what we need in our community," Dan said. "This is something huge for our community and is open to everyone to come along and hear his incredible story and get motivated by listening to him."





### Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

August 22nd - There was a reduced penning of lambs, while the sheep supply increased. Well finished trade and heavy weights were in good numbers, although there were no extra heavy weights. Plain quality and condition lambs were well supplied, along with the usual secondary quality lots. There was a very large variation in price through the

lambs, highlighting the variation in quality and condition. The usual buyers attended.

Market trends were generally dearer for the well finished medium weight trade lambs in comparison to the sale 2 weeks ago. The heavy trade lambs experienced little change. Heavy weights showed strong price gains as exporters competed strongly.

There were a couple of pens of grain assisted heavy Merino lambs penned, which made similar prices to the better crossbreds. Conversely, there were quite a few plain condition light weight Merino lambs that were almost unsaleable.

There were dearer trends through the sheep market, with processors competing strongly for any showing a higher level of finish, up by \$10 to \$20/head. There was some strong restocker competition for the plainer condition Merino sheep. Restockers competed heavily with processors looking to secure requirements, this resulted in those lines also showing significant price improvement.

### Weekly Wool Sales

August 24th - After last week's record breaking effort the wool market failed to maintain the rage. Most types came under pressure from the opening and continued to slip as the first day of sales progressed. Losses on the second day of sales were not as severe as the first with selected types managing to gain a few cents. The final wash up showed the Northern Region Indicator gave up around one third of last week's spectacular rises but still managed to close the week at its second highest level since AWEX began reporting the market. Currency movements were against us this week with

the indicator only falling a modest 18 cents when looked at in US dollars. 26,499 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate climbing to 10.8%. Major buyers included Seatech, Lempriere and Fox & Lillie. Discounts widened for lower strength, higher vegetable matter types whilst the better grown types were well sought after. Quantities on offer the coming weeks remain well below the corresponding period last season and look set to average around 35,000 bales per week.

### Armidale Cattle Sale

August 23rd - Numbers more than doubled in the fortnight. It was a very mixed quality penning, with condition on the plain side for the most part. There were a few better condition young cattle off crop. The increased numbers brought a larger gallery of buyers, which created increased competition.

Market trends through the young cattle were dearer than the sale 2 weeks ago, with restockers showing confidence. They were active on all classes of young cattle. Very plain condition light weight vealer steers returning to the paddock were met with high demand. Light and medium weight yearling steers saw improvements of as much as 15c/kg, under the increased

competition. Lightly muscled yearling heifers also sold to a dearer trend, with a large range in quality accounting for the large price range.

There were no well finished grown steers to quote. The limited supplies of well finished grown heifers suitable to processors sold firm to slightly dearer. There was good improvement in the cow market with increased processor competition. Very plain condition light weight cows were hard to sell, while the medium weight 2 score cows improved by an average of 15c/kg. Well finished heavy weight cows saw a dearer trend of as much as 14c/kg. Heavy bulls attracted greater demand and strong competition, making a dearer trend of as much as 25c/kg.


