A meeting to discuss strategies for the reinstatement of an independent Guyra Shire Council attracted around 60 people to the Guyra Bowling Club last Thursday.

As well as locals who are unhappy with the current amalgamated council, local candidates for the upcoming NSW election Country Labor's Debra O'Brien and Shooters, Fishers and Farmers' Rayne Single were also present.

Both of these parties support a plebiscite after the 2019 NSW State election if the current government is not returned.

The meeting was called to see if there was still a willingness within the community to see the forced amalgamation reversed. Four main speakers represented the Save and Grow Guyra Group – Gordon Youman, Rob Lenehan, Beth White and Robert Gordon.

They believe it is not too late to get Guyra Shire back. Gordon Youman said the decision to forcibly amalgamate Guyra Shire with Armidale Dumaresq was based on KPMG report that was not seen by delegates who made the decision.

"It's not right, we know it's not right $\mathchar`-$ there are other small

communities across NSW who are in the same boat," Mr Youman said. 'They talk to us and we have their support in this fight."

"We've got to get off our bums and fight for this locality, we've got to fight with these people and for these people. That's the long and short of it, there is no evidence that this is working." "We've got one more chance in March to get Guyra back. Not could, if or might - we can get Guyra back."

"You've seen what happened in Wagga at the recent poll, you saw what happened at Orange and you can see the mess this government is in. The SFF, Greens and Country Labor have all come together on this. "Come March next year, if there is a change of government it is the best chance we have. But we have to put our hands up now and let them know that we are not happy with the way our town is going."

Mayor asks what is your plan B?

ARC Mayor Simon Murray attended the Save and Grow Guyra meeting last week and responded to some of the issues that were raised. Cr Murray said that there was quite a bit of misinformation going on about council's finances and the future viability of a demerged Guyra Shire. He challenged those at the meeting to be realistic in their plans and make sure they have all the facts.

"I am worried that you are pushing the line that you want to demerge but you are not looking at plan B, which is what happens if the coalition gets back in," Cr Murray said.

"Tingha is likely to go and Guyra will then have 3500 people, so it would be extremely hard to meet the infrastructure backlog and to do so you would be looking at a 40-50% rate rise," Cr Murray said.

"I was there when the Shadow Minister offered a plebiscite, but he didn't say he would offer any money to go with deamalgamation. You need to be aware of the facts and realise that you would need a lot of money to be anywhere near sustainable."

"What are you going to do at the next local government elections? Guyra is too small to stand alone unless you are willing to pay extremely high rates. How are you going to run yourselves with 3500 people?"

"You are worried about representation, but are you pushing people to be on council? If you want decisions made you need to be represented on council."

Responding to criticism over a forecast \$3.8m deficit Cr Murray said that you can't move forward unless you know where you are.

"We have finally identified where we are and now we are working towards a zero deficit," Cr Murray said. "You are not all going to be convinced one way or the other but we are striving for a zero deficit by doing things more efficiently."

"Chances are 50/50 who will win the State election. If the current government are returned, what are you going to do. Are you going to put people up for the council election? I would love to see you do that."

Beth White (picture right) has been looking at the demerger process. She said that we are now witnessing things that were predicted prior to the amalgamation and are not that surprised.

"Something we need to look at before we go down this path is to develop strategies about where we see ourselves in this picture," Mrs White said. "As we plan towards this we need to work out how it is going to happen and where we would stand in all of this."

Robert Gordon (left) said we need to get political and that the real problem with local government is that it is being starved of funding and amalgamations do nothing to solve this.

'You asked what we have lost - we have lost our autonomy, we have lost our own pot of money, we've lost elected locals making decisions."

Mayor's Message

A combination of assistance measures and drought-proofing initiatives will be undertaken by Council through the Federal Government's announced extension of its Drought Communities Program.

Council's list of Drought Community Program initiatives includes improved counselling and support services, upgrades to a key livestock transport route, new water supply infrastructure and provision of bulk free water supplies. They provide a mix of shorter-term support and longterm measures that continue to assist our farming community during the lengthy process of recovering from the impacts of the current drought.

The list was finalised last week by Council's Drought Task Force and will be submitted to the Department of Infrastructure, Regional Development and Cities for approval.

A \$75 million extension of the Drought Communities Program was announced by the Federal Government in August to tackle the ongoing drought, with up to \$1 million available to each eligible Council.

Details of the extension were provided by the Government last month and Council has identified nine initiatives to utilise its share of the funds:

- a scholarship program for undergraduate rural students at UNE
- a mobile drought support van
- support for expanded rural financial counselling
- support and transportation of potable water supplies
- community outreach and support services
- essential repairs to cattle grids on public roads through rural properties to maintain safe access
- upgrade of Boorolong Road to assist freight truck access
- two water filling stations
- farm assistance through the BackTrack program

The UNE scholarships would take some financial stress off farming families so students can dedicate more time to their studies, rather than helping to run the farm. Similarly, the project with BackTrack would utilise the skills and experience of its members to offer growers assistance on their properties.

The support van and an expansion of existing counselling services would make support more readily available to primary producers and their families.



Two credit card-operated water filling stations, one each in Armidale and Guyra, would provide primary producers with convenient access to water during drought. At other times, the stations would be accessed by water carters and funds from those water sales could be pooled for future drought assistance measures. In addition, bulk supplies of free potable water would be made available to farming families for domestic use.

To further enhance our returns from the funding, Council is also liaising with the Tamworth, Inverell and Uralla councils to discuss how we can work together on some of those assistance initiatives.

For example, can we pool our resources on measures such as the counselling services, so our dollars can provide even more support for farmers suffering mental health issues or requiring financial guidance.

Armidale Regional Council's list of proposed measures combines physical infrastructure with personal assistance to maximise our use of the available funds, to help our community through the current hardship and make sure it is equipped to deal with those inevitable future droughts.

Fines issued for dumping

Council has taken action to fine a number of people for illegal dumping, following an investigation into rubbish left at a Dale Crescent property.

Penalty Infringement Notices have been issued to people believed to have illegally disposed of waste, amid community concerns about increasing levels of rubbish at the vacant site.

"It is an important time to remind the community that the dumping of waste within bushland is a serious offence," Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray said.

"It can have a number of impacts on people and the environment and offenders can receive spot fines of up to \$8,000. Council is very conscious of how illegal dumping impacts on our community and we will follow up so appropriate action is taken against offenders."

Cr Murray said Council would continue to monitor and investigate illegal dumping within the area. Council has contacted NSW Crown Lands to look at long-term solutions for the management of the site, which is owned by Land and Housing Corporation Family Community Services.

"Between Council's kerbside waste collection and recycling services, and the free disposal of electrical items and many recyclable materials at its Waste Management Facilities, there is plenty of opportunity for residents to conveniently dispose of their domestic waste," he said.

Growing Guyra

The Regional Growth Advisory Committee of Armidale Regional Council met in Guyra on Monday with the focus on initiatives that will kick start growth and attract visitors to Guyra.

The committee, which implements council's Economic Development Strategy, is made up of representatives from the Armidale Business Chamber, the Guyra & District Chamber of Commerce, Locals 4 Locals, and members of the community.

They meet regularly to consider ideas to improve the region as a place to live, attract new investment, support businesses, and increase tourism. Councillor Peter Bailey chairs the committee and said he was pleased to be in Guyra to come up with ideas for the town.

Guyra Chamber of Commerce President Hans Hietbrink and Secretary Aileen MacDonald represent Guyra on the committee. At this meeting they were joined by David Mills, Steve Mepham, David Bearup, June Paine and Neil Paine to throw around ideas about how to build and grow Guyra.

After consultation with members of the community, a

numbers of ideas were put forward. One of the ideas was a strategy for encouraging intensive horticulture by having a horticulture expo and conference in Guyra. A working committee was formed to progress idea and seek funding to get it off the ground.

Upgrades to the Mother of Ducks Lagoon was also on the agenda. Free camping already attracts visitors and by incorporating a walking track and pathway linking the rest of the town visitors would be encouraged to stay longer and take the time to visit the main street.

Council's Economic Development Officer Greg Lawrence stressed the need to embrace free camping and said if we don't they will move on to the next town. Beautifying and upgrading signage at the entrances to Guyra as well as the main street upgrade and the importance of festivals were also up for discussion.

Guvra's iconic Lamb & Potato Festival and the Trout Festival are well established and show how important festivals can be in getting people into town. Mr Lawrence said that he has identified these events as something he wants to put resources behind. He also advised that a report will go to council on October 24th following the completion of the business case and feasibility for the New England Rail Trail. The report was commissioned by ARC in conjunction with Glen Severn Council and looks into the costs of building the trail and also ongoing costs and the possible benefits for the area.

Mr Lawrence said that while they are based in Armidale, his team spend a lot of time thinking about how they can help Guyra and the outer regions to grow.

United effort brings fire services hub

Unique cooperation between is helping entrench Armidale as a regional epicentre for rural fire protection services.

Armidale Regional Council has worked closely with local NSW RFS heads to help plan and design a new facility for the service's Logistics Brigade. Currently under construction, the \$550,000 complex is Phase 2 of a multimillion-dollar NSW RFS development at Armidale Regional Airport and will house the brigade's vehicles and equipment.

"Council's assistance in creating the designs, getting the necessary approvals and undertaking much of the physical work has been invaluable in bringing the project together," NSW RFS Superintendent Steve Mepham said.

"This is a first in the way the RFS and local government can work together to bring much-needed emergency service facilities for regional communities.

"This new facility, and planned additional stages for the airport site, will provide operational and training support for brigades throughout the New England region and beyond."

Council and RFS officials joined the NSW Member for Northern Tablelands, Adam Marshall, at the site last week to inspect progress on the building's construction

and to announce the airport site will also include a new winch simulator training facility.

The Remote Area Fire Team (RAFT) Winch Simulator will be one of only four in regional NSW, training RFS personnel to use helicopter winches for rescues or to deliver firefighting crews to sites that are difficult to access.

The Logistics Brigade building, scheduled for completion in November, the simulator facility and the adjacent airbase constructed during Phase 1 represent a total investment of \$2 million at the Armidale airbase.

"Funding is also being sought for another \$5.7 million to build a new Fire Control Centre at the airbase, on land set aside by Council for the project.

"Council's contribution to this project has been crucial in bringing these facilities to Armidale, to create a fantastic headquarters that will provide administrative and operational support for our zone's 35 brigades, comprising around 1200 volunteers."

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray said the RFS provided an essential service for regional NSW and Council strongly supported any facility improvements that assisted the organisation.

"The colocation of these facilities in Armidale to create an RFS hub is also another welcome boost to activity in

Tenterden Station sells at auction

A well-known Guyra District property has sold under the hammer for \$17 million at a Ray White Rural auction held in Sydney on Friday October 12th. Bidding opened at \$9m rising quickly with 26 bids recorded. Three of the six registered bidders were active during the auction.

The property was bought by Miramar Trust and Riverslea Trust representing two Surat, Qld, farming families. The property was offered by Jim Knox, Avoncliffe, Guyra.

Tenterden comprises of 1501 hectares (3708 acres) of highly developed arable grazing land with the sale price equal to about \$11,326/ha (\$4585/acre).

A real feature of the property is the water provided for livestock. There are nu-

merous back up options with water supplied via an extensive reticulation system, irrigation bores, the main water storage dam plus regular dams and creek frontages. The relatively flat gradient and heavy soils supported by the irrigation licences are considered ideal to cater for a wide range of grazing, cropping, dairy or horticultural production systems. Tenterden also lends itself to future subdivision with frontage to four public roads.

The marketing of Tenderden Station was handled by Andrew Starr and Bruce Birch from Ray White Rural.

Weekly Wool Sales

The more positive tone towards the back end of sales last week carried over to the opening of this week's market.

The limited selection of broader Merino types led the market up with gains of up to 50 cents. The better style Superfine types were reported as generally unchanged, however the abundance of "hungry fine" tender types on offer continue to be a drag on the individual Superfine micron indicator quotes.

29,709 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 7.4%. Major buyers included Techwool, Seatech & Tianyu with strong support from the rest of the trade.

The rebound for the medium and broader micron Merino types is no doubt on the back of AWTA's testing data for the September quarter.

Nationally, the weight of wool tested between 21 and 24 microns was showing a staggering 39% decline for the season to date. The National Wool Production Forecasting Committee is meeting a month earlier than planned to review this season's forecast.

Current estimates were for a 5.7% fall in production however as seasonal conditions have not improved it's likely this number will be revised up considerably.
