Rail trail study completed - Council looks to next step

A study into the cost of establishing and maintaining a rail trail along the disused rail corridor between Armidale and Glen Innes has been completed and will be tabled at the Armidale Regional Council meeting in Guyra on Wednesday October 24th.

ARC commissioned the study in conjunction with Glen Innes Severn Council in May to look at the proposed New England Rail Trail and also to explore other tourism opportunities for the rail corridor.

The report concentrated largely on the section from Ben Lomond to Black Mountain with an estimated construction cost of \$6.5 million.

but also considered the broader perspective from Armidale to Glen Innes with the total cost of establishment at around \$24 million.

Ongoing costs for ARC would be around \$200,000 per annum for the maintenance of the Armidale to Ben Lomond section. The report also details a projected injection of \$4.5 million into local economies once established.

The proposed New England Rail Trail has been the subject of controversy since it was first proposed. The Save the Great Northern Rail Line Group was formed in 2014 to oppose the closing of the corridor and push for the reinstatement of rail services.

The NSW government held community consultation meetings in Guyra and Tenterfield last year, attracting both support and opposition.

In his report to council, Economic Development Officer Greg Lawrence recommends they endorse the the development of the Rail Trail project subject to funding.

He states that 'A do nothing approach is not considered appropriate as Council may miss the opportunity to secure adequate government funding to support the development of a visionary tourism destination that will generate economic prosperity for the city, towns and villages within the Armidale

and Glen Innes LGAs."

ARC Mayor Simon Murray is hopeful the recommendation will receive support at the meeting.

Cr Murray said that if the proposal is supported by Council, the next step would be to seek grant funding and commences talks with Glen Innes Severn Council.

"This would give direction to council staff to take the next step," Cr Murray said. "There would need to be a full business case study carried out, Glen Innes would need to confirm their support and it would need to be fully funded bv government grants."

Adventure playground for region

A new adventure playground will be built in Armidale with the NSW Government kicking in \$999,700 for the playground near the Visitor Information Centre.

The playground will have dedicated play areas for toddlers, younger children and school-aged kids, as well as a cable playzone, sand and water zone, musical play equipment, swing zone, and an open parkland area for ball sports.

It will have fencing, lighting, CCTV security, connection to services, a new bridge across Dumaresq Creek and a range of play equipment and landscape structures that are intended to stimulate the imagination of children while they play.

Plans include play equipment housed on close to 1,000 square metres of soft fall and with multiple picnic areas and barbecues and new amenity block that will be fully wheelchair accessible.

Another key feature of the park will be the inclu-

sion of play equipment that can be used by children of all abilities, including those in wheelchairs.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray said the location in Curtis Park would further strengthen the parklands as a social hub and he expected to see it attract people from right across the region.

"The super playground will be a fantastic asset for our regional community, to keep our kids active – physically and mentally – and encourage families to spend interactive time together," Cr Murray said.

"It will also be a further

attraction for people, especially young families, to settle in our region or for an extended stopover as they are travelling through."

A detailed design and the tender process will be undertaken and tentative plans could see construction start in mid-2019.

New Ranger vehicles



Animals secured by Armidale Regional Council Rangers will have a less stressful experience thanks to two new purpose-built vehicles received by Council recently.

More comfortable enclosures, including soft floors and better ventilation, will improve conditions for animals being transported in the two utes.

They will also provide improved safety for Council's Rangers because of the vehicles' four mobile aluminium cages and lifting devices, enabling staff to more easily and safely secure stray and dangerous animals and transfer them onto the vehicles.

"Our Rangers began using the new vehicles this month, providing a more efficient and safer service to the community," Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray said.

"It can be very stressing for pets when they go missing and these specialised vehicles will help to keep animals more calm and protected from the elements. "Importantly, it will also offer much safer working conditions for staff, who can be confronted with some dangerous situations when dealing with animals that might be frightened or aggressive."

Councillor Murray said pets are an important part of the Armidale region lifestyle and enhance quality of life for many residents.

Council can provide owners with tips on how to keep their dogs and cats safe, as well as advice on steps to take if they lose their pet.

Increased bloat risk in Spring

Warming temperatures and increased moisture levels correspond with the growth of lush grasses and legume pasture species and cattle and sheep producers need to be mindful that changes in diet can increase the risk of bloat.

Nigel Brown, District Vet, Northern Tablelands Local Lands Services, warns that a sudden intake of lush, green pasture can result in the production of large amounts of gas in the rumen (chamber of the stomach). If the animal is not able to get rid of it by belching, the rumen blows up - 'bloat'.

Understanding how bloat occurs helps in implementing the necessary steps to prevent it and Dr Brown recommends changes in diet be introduced gradually.

Rumen microflora require

approximately 10 - 14 days to adapt to a new diet. It is recommended that animals be fed hay or winter fodder in the morning before being put out to pasture for the first time. Grazing time should be limited to approximately 1 - 3 hours in the early afternoon, before stock are removed and returned to high fibre.

Dr Brown recommends that this should be undertaken daily for a week to ten days before stock are allowed to graze permanently. Signs that an animal may be affected include a reluctance to move, a distended left abdomen and rapid breathing.

"Animals experiencing symptoms should be kept moving," he said. "A stomach tube can be used to relieve the gas build-up. In severe cases, vegetable oil (or mechanical oil if vegetable is not available) can be administered to break down the gas in the rumen," said Nigel.

"In severe cases where an animal has gone down, a hole can be made into the rumen high on the left flank (where the swelling is greatest.) In these cases, it is important to seek veterinary advice, but often there isn't time," he said.

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

October 17th - There was only a small increase in numbers from the previous sale. Light weight Merino lambs made up a large percentage of the offering. There were 3 or 4 pens of high quality new season lambs penned along with limited supplies of well finished trade and heavy weight crossbred lambs. There was also a small supply of well finished Merino lambs suitable to the trade. The usual processors were

gains were reversed on the first

in attendance, while restockers were active on the light weight Merino lambs. With good rainfall over the past couple of weeks, the restocker confidence was high. This renewed confidence saw dearer trends for the Merino lambs going onto fresh crops and pastures with price improvements of as much as \$20/head. This in turn resulted in those light weight Merino lambs purchased by the trade showing dearer trends also. Well finished Trade Merino lambs were up to \$5/head dearer. Increased demand saw trade weight crossbred lambs show significant price improvements. The limited supply of heavy weight young lambs sold to a dearer trend with prices improving by \$12/head, however with a weight decrease this week to trend was greater. Heavy weight old lambs saw a dearer trend of \$10 to \$25/head. The comparison being to the previous sale 2 weeks ago. There were limited supplies of medium and heavy weight sheep penned. Light weight Merino sheep making up the bulk. Apart from a few crossbred ewes there were few sheep carrying anything but a lower skin value. A with the lamb market, trends showed significant price improvements. Only the plainest of the sheep remained firm.

day of sales this week and the market continued to retreat on the final day. This has left the benchmark Eastern Market Indicator closing at its lowest level for the season to date. The largest declines where in the Fine and Superfine micron categories that continue to be dragged down by an influx of seasonally affected poorer types. Merino Cardings were also dragged back substantially. When looked at in US dollars the EMI lost less than half of what it did in local currency due to a

somewhat surprising rise from

the Aussie dollar. 29,071 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate climbing to 19.4%, which is more than double the season's average for the year to date. Major buyers included Seatech, Techwool and Tianyu. Upcoming national offerings will increase slightly above this week's offering however the three week forecast falls along way behind the corresponding period last season. Forward markets remain very thinly traded however they are still indicating solid market conditions out until the end of this year.

Armidale Cattle Sale

October 18th - Despite beneficial rainfall over the past two weeks, there was an increase in numbers. Young cattle made up the bulk of the offering, with cows also in fair numbers. The condition of the offering was plain for the most part and quality was very mixed. The usual processors were operating. however there were very few cattle to suit. Restocker influence was very high. Demand for cattle returning to the paddock increased dramatically, with little regard shown for quality or condition. Weight also played little part in decisions. Market trends through the vealer and yearling cattle were much dearer, with some extreme sales recorded. They were not back to the high levels of the past, although some sales were not far off. The better quality yearling steers trended as much as 20c/kg dearer. The better quality yearling heifers suitable to feed were as much as 40c/kg dearer. There were no heavy grown steers to quote. The limited supply of grown heifers suitable to the trade were up to 6c/kg dearer. Demand for cows was high from both restockers and processors, with the market showing dearer trends of as much as 30c to 40c/kg. There was reduced competition for bulls, although the market showed a dearer trend increasing up to 5c/kg.
