Smashing start to Sunday at Spar

Staff and early morning customers were shocked to arrive at the Spar Supermarket in Bradley St. on Sunday morning to find the front window smashed by a car following a ram raid which happened at around 7.15am.

The owner of the supermarket, Asim Shahid, was alerted by staff, arriving soon after to survey the damage.

"It looks like somebody came over the footpath straight into the shop," Mr Shadid said. "There was quite a bit of damage to the front of the shop including the automatic door, front windows and counters."

"I think they came for the money and valuables which were all locked up, but they didn't get anything," he said. "Hopefully it will deter them from trying anything like this again."

Mr Shadid, who has owned the business for around six months, said up to now there had been no trouble.

"It's been a great local com-

munity and the street is usually quiet, so this is really disappointing," he said. "We hope to be open again in the next few days once the shop is made secure again."

Police are investigating the raid which involved three vehicles which were stolen during break and enter offences in Armidale in the early hours of the morning.

One of the vehicles was driven through the front of the Bradley Street store, with three offenders entering before leaving in the other two cars. The men have been described as Aboriginal/Torres Strait Islander appearance.

After the incident, one of the cars was burnt out on Starr Road, while the final vehicle was involved in a brief pursuit with police in Armidale, which was terminated and the vehicle was then recovered nearby.

Do you want Guyra Shire back?

The Save and Grow Guyra (SAGG) group will be out and about at electoral booths this weekend to collect voting slips in their Citizen Initiated Poll, which were mailed out to households last week. They are asking residents of the former Guyra Shire to give their views on whether Armidale Regional Council should be demerged, allowing Guyra to take back control of its own destiny.

They have been granted permission by the Electoral Commission to set up outside the polling booths in Guyra, Tingha, Ebor, Black Mountain and Ben Lomond. Residents are being asked to make sure their views are heard by marking yes or no and returning the slips when they go to vote in this weekend's State election.

Representatives from SAGG say that the poll is being conducted along similar lines to the election with secure boxes and independent observers, to ensure the integrity of the votes. They say that promised savings from the mergers have not eventuated and that this view is backed up by a recent financial analysis con-

ducted by the Save Our Councils Coalition (SOCC).

The SOCC regional and country analysis of 13 merged councils shows a combined deficit of \$48 million, whilst the study of seven metro council operating results will deliver a \$114 million shortfall. The report entitled "Council Amalgamations: A Sea of Red Ink" claims that despite combined grants totalling \$375 million to help with the amalgamation process, merged councils are not delivering the results promised.

Professor Brian Dollery, from the University of New England has spent 25 years looking at reform in local government and has examined local government amalgamations including forced amalgamations across NSW in 2004 and QLD in 2008.

"After ten years, we compared councils that were forcibly amalgamated with those that weren't and found no difference in the financial performance, so it was all for nothing," Professor Dollery said. "If you look at Tamworth, where the Regional Council was formed in 2004, it was the small communities that suffered in the

process due to centralisation".

Professor Dollery believes that when a three-year moratorium protecting jobs of council employees ends the same will happen in Guyra.

While he thinks that in principle Guyra can stand alone, he is not optimistic and says it would be a long haul.

"The question is really whether the State government is prepared to allow councils to de-amalgamate," he said. "The current government has no plans or processes that would allow that to happen and have still not ruled out further amalgamations."

"The Shadow Minister for Local Government Peter Primrose has indicated that Labor would allow it to happen if there is sufficient support, so it really depends on who wins the election and whether they honour that promise," he said. "The same thing happened in Qld with communities promised a referendum and the opposition changed their tune after the election making it very difficult to do so. Only four were successful in applying and they were forced to pay the costs."

Unprecedented investment

The Armidale region is in the midst of an investment boom with at least \$400 million being spent over the next few years in key economic growth areas.

Armidale Regional Councillor and Chair of the Regional Growth Advisory Committee Peter Bailey said Council is working closely with both the Federal and State Member to maintain momentum and drive investment in the Armidale Region.

"This is not only an investment boom but also true employment growth for the Armidale region as many of the projects are or will create new employment for the region," said Cr Bailey.

Mr Bailey noted a number of significant projects underway or recently completed. These include the Costa Tomatoes 3rd stage expansion in Guyra and Malpas Dam to Guyra Pipeline.

In Armidale the Hospital expansion, Armidale Secondary College, the relocation of the Australian Pesticides & Veterinary Medicines Authority and the Airport Business Park, are some of the projects currently underway.

Level 2 water restrictions still in place

Recent falls of rain in the area have made no impact on the catchment with the Guyra Dam level continuing to fall at approximately three percent a week.

The recent Bureau of Meteorology forecast of below average rainfall and the extremely dry catchments means there is little prospect of getting respite, at least in the short term.

As of Sunday 17 March the Guyra Dam level was 54 percent of capacity. Council continues to urge the Guyra community to conserve water and adhere to the level 2 water restrictions in place.

- NO Sprinklers or fixed hoses
- Hand held hoses, drip irrigation and watering of new turf can only be done for 2 hours after 6pm

• Washing vehicles with a hose can be used for two hours after 6pm

• Washing down surfaces with a higher pressure cleaner is OK

• Washing down hard surfaces with a hand held hose is not allowed

• Buckets and cans are OK

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Cr Simon Murray said it was important for Guyra residents and businesses to continue to conserve water.

"Unfortunately the rain that fell last weekend was not as much as hoped and there has been no improvement in the dam level," said Cr Murray.

"Guyra residents are doing an excellent job in conserving water but we need to continue to do more around the home to save where we can.

"We have also spoken to the

tomato farm who are also actively conserving their water usage above their normal water recycling levels."

Council would like to encourage Guyra residents to go beyond the level 2 restrictions and implement water conservation measures more broadly around the home at all times.

• Take shorter showers to save water and money!

• Use sprinklers or hoses in the early morning or evening.

• If there's rain in the forecast, let the rain do your watering for you.

• In the laundry, look out for the WELS label - this is displayed on the product or a swing tag.

• Water can be wasted around the home due to leaking pipes and dripping taps. Check for leaks and take action now!

Mayor's Message

Recent Federal and State commitments to upgrading the Kempsey Road have been a significant victory for a joint campaign between the Armidale and Kempsey councils.

Half a million dollars in funding was announced by the Federal Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce, this month to upgrade a 2.3km section of Kempsey Road. The money, provided through the Drought Communities Program, will assist an \$800,000 upgrade Council will soon begin between Oaky River Dam Road and the start of the sealed section of Kempsey Road just before Oaky River.

That announcement was followed just days later by confirmation from the State Member for Northern Tablelands, Adam Marshall, that \$4.6 million would be provided through the NSW Fixing Country Roads program. An additional 14.4km section of Kempsey Road will be improved using those funds, including the notorious section known by locals as Big Hill.

Staff and elected members from the Armidale and Kempsey councils have been working together since early last year, seeking a long-term commitment from government for improved maintenance of Kempsey Road. Delegates from both council attended a residents forum in Lower Creek in late April, when the condition of the road was the hot topic.

Kempsey Road is a vital arterial link for the various communities along its length, as well as a regionally important link between the Northern Tablelands and the coast.

Our shared campaign includes a push for the restoration of Regional Road status for this important link. That status was removed for the Armidale local government area section in 2008, leaving the council with

the responsibility of maintaining Kempsey Road when it doesn't have the budgets to give the road the attention it needs.

As voters prepare to go to the polls for this weekend's State election, Council has been heartened by commitments given about Kempsey Road's future status.

Thank you to everyone who came out and supported last weekend's New England Festival. It was terrific to be part of Saturday's street parade and see the many people lining the new route.

As the event, previously known as the Autumn Festival, moved to a new name and a greater emphasis on activities in the Beardy Street Mall, the heart of the city was buzzing.

The bands again brought magnificent colour and sounds, while the parade was another great celebration of our region's multicultural diversity.

Attention now turns to the inaugural Colour New England Street Arts Festival on Saturday 6 April. Local artists, musicians, writers, performers and crafters will converge on Beady Street Mall for a day of fun and creativity from 2pm. Attractions include international chalk artist Rudy Kistler, who will transform the centre of the mall with a 3D artwork - and the creation of a mural celebrating the region's wonderful autumn colours, long days and wide open skies. Kids and adults can also enjoy plenty of hands-on activities.

Tank removal completed

Contractors have finished removing disused fuel tanks from beneath Guyra's main street, clearing an obstacle for a major upgrade of the town's central business district.

A total of eight steel tanks were found and removed between 19 February and 7 March, all under the eastern side of Bradley Street.

Tests using ground penetrating radars late last year indicated there could be as many as 19 disused fuel tanks beneath Bradley Street and the footpath.

However, excavations at the identified locations ultimately found seven in front of Burgess Garage and another in front of the former Thrifty Link Hardware site.

Materials excavated during the tanks' removal are now being analysed, which is expected to take around three weeks and will indicate what remediation of the sites is required.

"We will then know the full cost of removing the tanks and treating the sites, which will allow us to determine the final budget and scope for the main street upgrade," Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray said.

The \$2.7 million main street upgrade will complement the historic architecture of the street, create a more consistent theme throughout the street landscape and provide a safer environment for pedestrians.

Notice to Water Consumers

Guyra - Level 2 Water Restrictions in place

Guyra's town water supply, Guyra Dam, has dropped to 53% of its capacity (at 19 March 2019) and Guyra is now in Level 2 water restrictions. Regulation 137 of the Local Government (General) Regulation 2005 permits the use of water to be restricted in the Armidale regional local government area if there is a shortage of supply. This notice will remain in effect until further notice. The restrictions (see right) apply to the use of water supplied through the Armidale Regional Council water reticulation system for the township of Guyra:

Under the Local Government Act 1993, the maximum penalty that may be applied for a breach of imposed water restrictions is \$2,200 for corporations and \$220 for individuals.

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

March 13th - Guyra sheep and lamb numbers eased, with most of the decrease seen in the lamb section. Overall quality in the lighter categories was plain, although the top end of the heavy lambs showed good finish. Re-

stocker competition was quite strong, and all other operators were present.

Light lambs saw cheaper trends owing to the lack of quality. This eventuated in the light restockers selling to cheaper trends. Shorn

restocker lambs sold to slightly dearer trends, particularly the fresher lambs. Quality trade lambs sold to dearer trends, while lambs showing dryness sold to cheaper prices. Heavy lambs also saw prices ease, with a top price of

\$180/head.

Trade ewes sold to cheaper trends, while the light restocker sheep with only light wool cover saw dearer trends. At the time of reporting, no wethers had been sold.

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Sales

March 15th - Further losses were recorded by the wool market this week over both selling days. All sectors gave up ground with a fairly uniform fall across the spectrum. Once again it was the abundance of wool showing imperfections that suffered the heaviest falls as buyers became more selective in their purchases. AWEX report that the average yield for Merino fleece wool this week was 63.6% which is at the lowest level in over 10 years. The more stylish higher yielding types remain keenly sought after and fell by less than half of the overall market quote. 35,682 bales were sold nationally for the week

with the passed in rate climbing to 12.5%. Major buyers included Seatech, Tianyu and Techwool. Next week's national offering has ballooned out to an expected 44,000 bales which is substantially above what was predicted this time last week. Weekly offerings are then expected to fall below the 40,000 mark for the following fortnight. State Wool Production Forecasting Committees are due to meet over the coming week and with AWTA and AWEX data all tracking lower than the previous forecast the outcomes from these meetings will be interesting.

Armidale Cattle Sale

March 14th - There were a few less numbers throughout, with a slight increase in yearlings and a similar cow offering. Quality overall improved, particularly cows that saw considerable increases. Restocker competition saw cow grades improve for the lighter drafts, while the trade responded to the improvement in quality of the heavy cows. Young cattle quality also improved, conversely, there were still large numbers plainer heifers on offer and these categories saw mainly cheaper trends. All the regular operators were present, along with an extra store cow order and some local restocker activity on the weaner cattle.

Light weaners to restock saw dearer trends of 14c to 18c/kg. The

offering of some plainer quality heifer weaners saw cheaper trends of up to 30c/kg. Good quality steer yearlings to feed sold to dearer trends of 30c, as did medium weights, also up over 30c/kg. There were drafts of lesser quality yearling heifers offered, the lighter drafts to feed back 11c, while the medium weights were back 9c to 17c/kg to restockers.

Heavy steers to the trade were 10c better, while the heifers to the trade saw dearer trends of 20c/kg. All cows saw an increase in trends, with light D1 cows up to 19c/kg better. D2 categories saw prices increase 6c to 13c, while D3 and D4 cows sold to rising trends of 20c/kg. An average bull offering saw cheaper trends throughout.


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School leaders inducted
