The result of the Citizen's Initiated Poll which was held in conjunction with the NSW State Election demonstrates an overwhelming result in favour of deamalgamation according to the Save and Grow Guyra Group.

The results released by the group reveal that a total of 89% of the residents from the former Guyra Shire area who participated in the poll believe in, and voted for, the demerger of the Armidale Regional Council.

The counting of the votes took place on Tuesday March 26th, with the count and recount conducted in the presence of six JPs. The group has defended the validity of the result, and say it is not a surprise to see claims and counter claims given the strong result.

They say that the number of polling forms completed was more than 60% of the votes cast in the five polling booths and if you take the percentage of all election voters the YES vote is still 54.3%.



Votes were collected in sealed boxes which were opened in the presence of six IPs who witnessed the counting

A statement released by the group said that they are now taking on board the responsibility to react to what they say is an expression of the will of the people.

"The result upheld views clearly expressed and widely reported prior to the 2016 forced merger and with a result like this it seems that the amalgamated council and all of the accompanying "bribe money" has not changed the belief that we have been, and will be better off with, a Guyra Shire Council. The Guyra based community took this opportunity to demonstrate that we are not content to see a town sucked dry and into oblivion, in the shadow of the 'City of Armidale'."

"The process of taking a poll as people left the state election booth was the best measure available to us, as agreed by the NSW electoral commission. We are to assume people do not vote in the state election twice. Our booths were manned to give everyone a chance to vote once and in the process we looked for an emblem on the reverse side of each paper or sought an explanation. The scrutineers asked about the status of voters as a Guvra Council area resident and were advised not to enter into debate but to note any inconsistencies. Non-residents were informed of their ineligibility to record a vote. Where we were made aware of a breach, we accounted for that in our processes."

"In the case of offence being taken by a local resident expressing a 'no' vote we note that some personalities can be seen as offensive - and if offence was taken, it is unfortunate as we are sure none was intended.'

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Innaccurate and misleading

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray has compared the results of the Citizen's Initiated Poll with the Brexit vote, saying that it is easy to say yes to a demerger, but how do you make that happen. He says a figure of 89% in favour of demerging as quoted by the Save and Grow Guyra group is misleading.

"I don't think it is reflective of the population and I have heard reports of people who weren't from the Guyra Shire area who were asked to vote so you have to question the process," Cr Murray said.

"If you look at the results as they have been portrayed they are inaccurate. It really should be based on the number of people who voted, not just adding up the number of yes and no votes. The figures are less impressive when the number of "yes" votes is divided by the number of election voters."

Cr Murray said that the group's claim that a significant Yes vote in Tingha was the

first time they had been given a choice is false.

"Ian Tiley surveyed the town during his time as administrator, and council did a postal survey and had meetings with the community," Cr Murray said.

"Every time they were in favour of leaving Armidale Regional Council and anyway this result is meaningless because it is already a fait accompli that Tingha will move to Inverell."

Cr Murray also defended his position on demerger, which he was quoted as being in favour of shortly after being elected.

"If Tingha was still with us I would still support the community if they chose to demerge, but without Tingha Guyra does not have the population to support its own council. Even with Tingha it would struggle to be viable,

and with only 3500 people it is not sustainable. Uralla has twice the population and it is looking at a huge rate rise to keep going."

"People may want to demerge but do they know the implications, it sounds like a good idea but how do you make it happen- what will be the costs of demerging and who will pay for long term running costs."

Mayor's Message

Armidale's water supply and favourable climate are among its great strengths to provide quality of life and drive economic development in our region.

In comparison to the surrounding districts and many other parts of Australia, we have a good water supply to meet the needs of our population and our cooler climate tends to protect us against the potential impacts of drought. However, the current drought and consequent implementation of water restrictions have demonstrated the Armidale region is not immune to water shortages.

Council is taking the responsible action of reviewing its long-term plans for water supply infrastructure. Last week's March Ordinary Meeting voted to request staff present a report on Council's 30-year plan for its water and wastewater infrastructure.

We need to ensure the region has adequate provision for water infrastructure in the decades to come, as we push to realise our potential for significant economic and population growth.

The Malpas Dam to Guyra pipeline currently being constructed, to provide water security when Guyra's own supply gets low, is a great example of proactive infrastructure to safeguard supply.

However, any improvements to our water supply structures must go hand in hand with responsible water consumption.

Many residents and organisations in the Armidale region are already conscientious and efficient in how they use water.

Water-efficient appliances, water saving showerheads and mixers and native plants suited to our climate are prominent in many households. Recent horticultural developments in the area, such as Costa's expanded tomato production near Guyra, are harvesting rain water to be largely water self-sufficient.

But statistics show we have a long way to go as a region. Average water consumption for Armidale households is 222 litres per person per day, well behind the NSW average of 174 litres and the national average of 194.

The foresight of previous leaders has left us in a fortunate position, with the capacity of Malpas Dam modelled on a population well above current levels, but the water restrictions now in place are a reality check that we cannot be complacent and assume we are immune to shortages in extremely dry periods. Even after last weekend's rain, water levels at Guyra



Dam are half its capacity, requiring Level 2 water restrictions, and Level 1 restrictions remain in place for Armidale, with Malpas Dam at 57%.

The experiences of other NSW regions, and the example set by many locals, show there are many simple steps to easily curb our consumption.

Just by bringing our usage down to the State average, we could fulfil our ambitions for population and economic growth and still have ample supply to meet our requirements in all but the most severe dry periods.

If our long-term projections and strategies still identify a need for bigger dams or other works to boost our supply, it's highly likely Council would need to look for government grants to fund these projects.

It just as likely our applications for this funding would need to demonstrate our community has done everything we can to manage our consumption. Many of the solutions are in our own hands, literally, as we reach for the tap.



NSW Farmers welcomes new marshall for agriculture

New base station at Baldersleigh

Residents in Baldersleigh can now access more mobile coverage in their area following the switch-on of a new mobile base station.

Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce, said the new Telstra infrastructure forms part of the Liberal National Government's \$380 million Mobile Black Spot Program.

The site is among 42 new and upgraded mobile base stations being rolled out across the New England Electorate under this program.

Earlier this month it was announced \$160 million would be allocated for a further two funding rounds.

Rounds 5 and 6 will have a strong focus on improving mobile coverage at public interest premises in regional areas, such as medical centres, schools and tourism facilities.

Over the first four rounds, the Mobile Black Spot Program is already delivering 1047 new base stations nationally from \$220 million in Commonwealth funding.

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

March 27th - There was a reduction in the lamb numbers, while sheep supplies increased. The quality of the lambs was very mixed. There was a good supply of well finished lambs. Plain quality and condition lambs were in fair supply. The usual processors were in attendance, while restockers were active on suitable lots.

Supply and demand were the major factors in dearer market trends through the lambs. Light weights to processors experienced improvements of \$12 \$18/head. The better quality restocker lambs saw little change. Well finished lambs to process in the 18-22kg weight classes saw significant price improvement. Heavy weight lambs over 22kg were the least affected to show a moderately dearer trend.

There was a large supply of Merino ewes of varying ages and condition. The majority of these ewes carried at least 6 months wool. There were some very well finished crossbred ewes penned. Demand was very high across all categories as supply diminishes through the system. Restockers were active on all the Merino ewes with the younger lines attracting strong support. Market trends were significantly dearer with prices improving by as much as \$40/head. The very plain quality and condition ewes were cheaper.

Weeklu Wool Sales

March 29th - The gradual downtrend continued with the market posting its fifth successive week of losses however its remains at a level well above the commencement to 2019. The larger falls were registered on the first day of sales impacting mainly the finer types and the Merino Carding Indicator. The pattern of recent times also continued with the abundance of low yielding, poorer style types suffering the biggest losses.

The diminishing supply of better style types has seen them remain in keen demand and they were reported as selling to levels very similar to last week. 32.979 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 11.8%.

Major buyers included Techwool. Seatech and Fox & Lillie with the top 4 accounting for over 50% of the Merino Fleece wool on offer for the week. With three quarters of the current wool selling season done AWEX auction statistics are showing a 12.4% decline in the volume of wool offered nationally. With the North, South and Western regions down

11.5% and 9.1% respectively. In a positive sign the market is close to stabilising the Western region closed the week slightly dearer.

Armidale Cattle Sale

March 28th - There was a halving of numbers with cows and vealers making up the bulk of the offering. There were limited supplies of yearlings and grown cattle. The quality and condition was very mixed. There were some very well presented vealers along with a few well finished yearlings. Cows varied from very plain through to some high quality, high yielding heavyweights. The usual buyers were in attendance, along with extra restocker competition. There was a different live export order operating on heavy

Both competition and demand was very high through the vealers with both restockers and processors competing strongly. This resulted in dearer trends. Steer vealers returning to the paddock saw a trend that was upwards of 50c/kg dearer, more in places with a quality related component also. There were similar trends through the heifer portion and more, particularly those vealers to

processors. Yearling steers to restock and feed were quite mixed in quality, they saw a dearer trend of up to 35c/kg. The better quality heifer portion experienced a similar trend. The plainer quality and condition heifers saw a vastly improved market trend.

There was an increased supply of well finished grown heifers, they attracted strong demand from processors. Little from last week to make a comparison. Restockers were active on the plainer grown heifers with that market showing significant improvement. The cow market was 20c/kg dearer and more in places for the well finished medium and heavyweights as processors competed strongly to secure requirements. The plainer condition cows experienced strong gains also. That live export order pushed the bull market to a much dearer trend, however those purchased by processors experienced a moderate price


